THE ILLUSION OF IMMUNITY

FACE TO FACE WITH REALITY, WE OFTEN REFUSE TO ACCEPT THE FACT THAT IT COULD HAPPEN TO US

WEBSTER defines "illusion" as "state or fact of being deceived." "Immunity" is defined as "state of being protected, as against a disease." One evening, in a talk before a Pittsburgh AA group, these two words came out as I tried to explain why, although I was a full-blown and admitted alcoholic in 1953 when I attended my first AA meeting, I then ran away and never returned until 1959.

I have given much thought to this phenomenon in the past ten years of wonderful sobriety. During these years, I have seen hundreds of intelligent, apparently otherwise normal human beings repeat this same insanity: reject the one thing that offers the only hope in a seemingly hopeless life; run from the only people who are willing and able to help; refuse to see that this Fellowship, by proven record, is the one agency most likely to restore them to a happy, productive life.

If I could understand why I did it, I believed, perhaps I could better understand them. My thinking took me back to World War II, when I flew thirty combat missions as a B-17 pilot. I recalled the three AM briefings, where the announcement of targets like Bremen and Berlin was greeted by sharp breath intakes and feelings of vague dread and fear. This was 1944, and losses in the Eighth Air Force were heavy. We all knew that from some raids as many as ten percent would not return. But there was a saving factor: To a man, we all knew that we would not be part of that ten percent. We knew that other men would be killed—but not us. The other man. This is "the illusion of immunity." The men hitting the beaches of the Pacific and Normandy also had this protective illusion. Without it, the strain and fear would no doubt have become intolerable.

Now, how did I apply this to myself as an alcoholic? In 1953, under pressure, I was driven to Alcoholics Anonymous. I was forced to attend some meetings until I could regain my position, recoup my losses, pacify my family, and con my friends. In the process of doing this, I heard many AA speakers. I heard men who had lost their jobs, but I knew I never would. I heard men who had lost their families, but I knew I never would. I heard men and women who had lost their health, but this could never happen to me. I heard of people who had lost their reason, but I knew this could never happen to a smart guy like me. I heard AA's talk about the terminal victims of chronic alcoholism, but I scoffed at this ridiculous possibility. In short, as you already know, I hid safe and untouchable behind the illusion of immunity.

TRADITION ONE-

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity. ...Probably no society sets a higher value on the personal welfare of the individual member than does AA. But long ago we found that the common welfare had to come first; without it there could be mighty little personal welfare. In the beginning we felt very much like Eddie Rickenbacker and his company when their plane crashed in the Pacific. They had been saved from death but found themselves still floating upon a dangerous sea. There was no doubt in their minds that the common welfare came first. Nobody dared rock that raft, lest they all perish. Bread and water were shared equally; there were no gluttons.

Our case was something like that. But some of our sick and careless member did rock the raft, and that scared us to death. Some of those early fears are today almost amusing...like other societies, we soon found that there were forces that could threaten us in ways that alcohol...could not. These were desires for power, for domination, for glory, and for money. They were all the more dangerous because they were invariably powered by self-righteousness, self-justification, and the destructive power of anger, usually masquerading as righteous indignation.

Pride and fear and anger—these are the prime enemies of our common welfare. True brotherhood, harmony, and love, fortified by clear insights and right practices, are the only answers. And the purpose of AA's traditional principles is to bring these forces to the top and keep them there. Only then can our common welfare be served; only then can AA's unity become permanent.

San Diego Central Office maintains a confidential database that contains general group information (i.e. meeting time, location, group secretary, group coordinator, a mailing address, and other info) for the purpose of meeting your needs, the community needs (5th Tradition), and maintaining contact with you—the San Diego AA Coordinator is mailed to you (group secretary gets three copies and group coordinator gets one copy-2 separate mailings) using information you provide. We are currently mailing our newsletter to approximately 580 secretaries in San Diego County and substantially fewer coordinators (150?-our single mailing includes buck-a-month members and courtesy co-op copies to Intergroup functions in other cities; total approximately 320). Every month we get some return mail—But this is not about the mail!! There are 768 listed meetings in our schedule and we only have addresses for 580 (AND SOME OF THAT NEEDS TO BE UPDATED!).

Here are some more of the numbers: about 64 of the 768 groups have 7 meetings a week . . .that's 1152 meetings per week in San Diego.

At a meeting, when the baton gets passed from one servant to another, sometimes we don't get the proper info to update your group. Central Office get hundreds-even thousands—of phone calls every month asking for group and meeting information. We can't give them what we don't have, and we can only maintain contact with you with current information. This is where we need your input CALL Central Office (265-8762)—ANYONE WHO ANSWERS THE PHONE AT CENTRAL OFFICE CAN HELP YOU HELP US-and ask whoever answers the phone to fill out a BLUE form (the olde GROUP AND MEETING INFORMATION CHANGE FORM) for your group. You will need to know the meeting day, time, location, secretary, and a little more; but you're on your way! And we feel even more secure about our ability to serve your needs, and the alcoholic that calls and asks us about a meeting in their (or your) neighborhood. Ahh! Life Is Good! Do we ever understand what we think? We only understand that thinking which is a mere equation, and from which nothing comes out but what we put in. That is the working of the intellect. But beyond that there is a thinking in primordial images—in symbols which are older than historical man; which have been ingrained in him from earliest times, and, eternally living, outlasting all generations, still make up the groundwork of the human psyche. It is only possible to live the fullest life when we are in harmony with these symbols; wisdom is a return to them. It is neither a question of belief nor of knowledge, but of agreement of our thinking with the primordial images of the unconscious. They are the source of all our conscious thoughts, and one of these primordial thoughts is the idea of life after death. Science and these symbols are incommensurables. They are indispensable conditions of the imagination; they are primary data—the materials whose expediency and warrant to exist science cannot deny offhand. It can only treat them as given facts, much as it can explore a function like that of the thyroid gland, for example. Before the nineteenth century the thyroid was regarded as a meaningless organ, merely because it was not understood. It would be equally short-sighted of us today to call primordial images senseless. For me these images are something like psychic organs, and I treat them with the 2PM—SUN very greatest care. It happens sometimes that I must say to the older patient: "Your picture of God or your idea of

Ample parking is available either at the Convention Center itself or in nearby parking lots for \$2-\$4/ hour.

Jon P., the Volunteer Coordinator, is seeking A.A.'s with data entry skills to enter the names of the volunteers into the computer system the weekends of January 21-22 and January 28-29. Please contact Jon at (619) 259-0955 if you can help. Volunteers can expect to be contacted by their committee chair by mid-March.

There still seems to be some confusion about the need to register for the convention. There are many expenses associated with holding a convention for upwards of 50,000 people, including rent for meeting halls and providing a transportation system.

In keeping with the spirit of our Seventh Tradition and a Conference Advisory Action; International A.A. Conventions must be self supporting. No funds from group contributions, literature sales, or the Reserve Fund are used to put on this convention.

Thus, each and every volunteer and attendee at the International Convention—A.A., Al-Anon, Alateen or Guest—must pay the registration fee: \$65 in advance and \$70 on-site. Advance mail registration is available until May 15. Registration forms can be obtained at your Central Office or from your General Service Representative. Those who do not register will not be able to attend convention events and meetings. Regular A.A. meetings in the San Diego area can accommodate those who do not register.

Staff members at the General Service Office in New York are responsible for coordinating the convention. G.S.O. is part of A.A. World Services, Inc., one of the subsidiary entities of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous. Providing overall guidance and direction are members of the Trustees' and Conference Committees on International Conventions/Regional Forums, all with the approval of the General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous.

It was at the historic Second International convention in St. Louis in 1955 that the 3,500 A.A.'s present accepted from the oldtimers the charge to maintain our Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity, and Service through the General Service Conference. Almost forty years later, with over two million members in almost 150 countries around the world, we can only hope and pray that we have kept our end of the bargain.

Like all illusions, this one vanished, in a puff of smoke and alcoholic fumes. For the next six years, I demonstrated the progressiveness of alcoholism. Finally and gratefully, in 1959, I returned to AA devoid of all illusions and ready to face facts. It worked. One day at a time, I have enjoyed sobriety and the many wonderful and undeserved gifts that a loving God has heaped on me.

But I must never forget, as I make a call on a new man or woman and prepare to relate my experiences, that this alcoholic, apart from feeling a little temporary discomfort over a recent scare of an unnerving or humiliating experience, is safely wrapped in that same "illusion of immunity."

It's my job to tear the illusion down. It's my job to make this alcoholic realize that he is the other

man.

The Twelve Concepts for World Service — Concept VII —

"The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is furt5her understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for its final effectiveness"

This Concept attempts to clarify the relationship and "balance of powers" between the Conference and the General Service Board. ...On the one hand, "the board is invested with complete legal power over A.A.'s funds and services; on the other hand the Conference is clothed with such great influence and financial power it could overcome the legal rights of the board.

"Thus, the practical power of the Conference is, in the final analysis, superior to the legal power of the board. This superior power derives from the traditional influence of the Conference Charter itself; from the fact that the delegates chosen by the groups always constitute more than two-thirds of the Conference members"; and finally from the ability of the delegates to cut off financial support by the groups. "Theoretically, the Conference is an advisory body only; but practically speaking, it has all the ultimate power it may ever need."

"If... the Conference will always bear in mind actual rights, duties, responsibilities and legal status of the General Service Board; and if the trustees... will constantly realize that the Conference is the real seat of ultimate service authority...neither will be seriously tempted to make a 'rubber stamp' out the other. ... In this way, grave issues will always be resolved and harmonious cooperation will be the general rule."

6 Ways To Relieve Self-Pity

In this life of ours I suppose everyone at certain times is misunderstood, unappreciated and perhaps even sometimes unjustly treated. I, however, thought all these things had happened to me and I was nursing all the hurts in the world. I was just spilling over with self-pity.

I was on my way to do the only thing I thought advisable, get more liquor. As I was passing the home of my brother, he dragged me in, put me to bed and called the doctor. The doctor caring for me in my last illness informed me that he could fix me up physically but he could not cure my drinking. He advised me to contact AA. That was the first time a sensible thing had been said to me relative to my drinking.

I was still plenty sorry for myself as I wended my way to my first AA meeting, arriving as advertised in bad shape.

After that meeting and many more I learned there were six things I must do to relieve the self-pity that I had come to know so well.

First—I must never nurse a hurt. Brooding over a personal bruise only makes you feel sorry for yourself.

Second—Remember the virtue of good humor. A person who can smile with others, not at them, and one who can laugh at himself is one who can see his problem in terms of a larger perspective. Fine humor is needed to combat self-pity.

Third—Learn the meaning of the verb "to trust." Faith and trust in God's care is no little thing. It's a power to be put to work in everyday life. "Perfect love casts out fear"—even fear of oneself. As active alcoholics and even since being sober we are afraid of ourselves. This we must battle to win.

Fourth—Discover the adventure of forgiveness. To forgive is no soft or sentimental act. It more often is an act of true courage. It takes guts to forgive but it brings an inner glow that few of us ever experienced.

Fifth—Don't run off. Dropping out of an organization, fellowship, or out of life, only complicates the problem. To try to control the situation is always better than letting the situation control you. You can't hide yourself from you. The fellow who faces the music is the leader of the band.

Sixth—Learn to love others and be honest. As Shakespeare said, "To thine own self be true, and it follows as the night the day, thou canst not then be false to any man." Honesty must come from the inside. Honesty to self is a very important ingredient of AA. We must learn to engage the brain before putting the mouth in gear. Speak well of others and as John Wesley said, "Do all the good you can, to all the people you can, in all the ways you can, as long as ever you can."

LOVE

The spiritual growth we enjoy in Alcoholics Anonymous is a product of the never ending school for living which our Fellowship provides. The subject in that school that opened my eyes most quickly and filled my heart most fully was love.

I really never knew what true love was until I began my recovery in AA. My schooling in that emotion began early and led me to the conclusion that love is what creates in the attitude of a sober AA member the outer show of an inner glow.

I misunderstood the mutuality of love so much that when I heard a husky guy at a men's stag meeting say, "You can just feel the love that fills this room," I leaned over to whisper to my sponsor, "I think I've got to go outside and throw up." He whispered right back, "Go ahead, then rush back and start learning about love." I did and I've kept learning ever since.

Discoveries about love started when someone explained that AA love is basically wishing someone well. We wish those who share our disease and solutions "the very best," which is continued sobriety. No one will ever wish a fellow alcoholic a return to the bottle, even one whom he may dislike. I was told, "getting sober means you don't have to like someone to love him or her."

I had come to AA from forty years in a cutthroat business where it was considered stupidity to do a favor for someone who would never be in a position to return that favor a hundred times over.

So it was a revelation to find it easy and rewarding to care and share, to know that it is impossible to lovingly give without receiving or to get without giving with love.

I was moved deeply when I read and accepted the reality of Dr. Bob's statement that our Twelve Steps simmered down to resolve themselves in two words: love and service. And I became aware how well those two words blend, for love without service is sentimentality and service without love is an empty gesture.

The role played by love in our program emerged even more clearly when I was told, "Let us love you until you can learn to love yourself" and "Live in our hearts and pay no rent." How well I knew then that I belonged in AA, that I was at last home, that I would, never again be alone, that I would as our book tells us, make lifelong friends in an atmosphere where there is always love.

My class in love continued. I learned that love is the motivating force behind the attitude of gratitude and the emotion that makes true the shortest paragraph in our book; "It works. It really does." It is the force behind the reality in another sentence from the book: "The age of miracles is still with us."

The love I found in AA assured me that there are no strangers in our Fellowship, only friends we have not yet met.

The Twelve Concepts for World Service — Concept VIII —

"The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities."

This Concept deals with the ways the General Service Board "discharges its heavy obligations," and its relationship with its two subsidiary corporations: A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc.

Long experience has proven that the board "must devote itself almost exclusively to the larger questions of policy, finance, group relations and leadership....In these matters, it must act with great care and skill to plan, manage and execute."

The board, therefore, must not be distracted or burdened with the details of the endless questions which arise daily in the routine operation of the General Service Office or the publishing operations, including the *Grapevine*. "It must delegate its executive function" to its subsidiary, operating boards.

"Here, the board's attitude has to be that of custodial oversight....The trustees are the guarantors of good management of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc....by electing the directors of these service arms, a part of whom must always be trustees....The executive direction of these functions is...lodged in the ...service corporations themselves, rather than the General Service Board. Each corporate service entity should possess its own bylaws, its own working capital, its own executives, its own employees, its own offices and equipment."

Bill draws from earlier mistakes by the General Service Board in trying to run the service functions directly and warns repeatedly against "too much concentration of money and authority."

WHAT'S A GROUP CONSCIENCE?

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority — a loving God as He may express himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

One of the most appealing statements to me in all of the AA literature is the twelve words in the middle of the Second Tradition: "a loving God as He may express himself in our group conscience." This told me that God was speaking to me through my group, through Alcoholics Anonymous. As long as I listened to this message, I couldn't go wrong. My whole attitude and outlook upon life would change. I would know a new freedom and a new happiness. I would not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it. These were the things I was

hearing around the tables.

Through the Second Tradition I have also learned to turn my will and my life over to the care of God as I understand him. In the beginning, when I was first sobering up, I didn't like to hear about God. But a strange thing happened; for the first time in my life I was among people with whom I felt at ease. Never had I been with a peer group before. I always felt better than the rest or beneath them -- usually the latter.

Here, then, was a group of close friends before whom I could tell my most personal problems; things I once felt would go to the grave with me where now laid out on the table and discussed. A feeling of confidence came to me, and I knew everything was going to be alright.

Alcoholics Anonymous is a very unusual association. Not because of our Steps or the principles by which our members try to live, but because of the Twelve Traditions that hold us together. None is more unusual than this Second Tradition.

All organizations have someone presiding, someone who is entitled to give orders, to pass out directives, and to speak for the entire organization. This is not the case with AA. Recently one of our members, upon learning that he had been elected trustee-at-large for the United States, remarked, "I have finally worked my way to the bottom" Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.

Whenever we ask for a vote on a controversial issue in our group, should this be called a group conscience vote? It can if it meets certain criteria. Some of the things to consider before calling it a group conscience vote are as follows:

First- Is the group well informed? Have both sides been heard and thoroughly discussed? Are we giving respectful attention to the minority's point of view? Many of us feel that AA should not engage in any controversy, but our Tenth Tradition only talks about "public controversy." The AA program was build on a great deal of controversy.

Second- If it is an important decision, has there been ample time for members not present to voice their opinion? Or is some eager beaver trying to push through a quick vote before the group becomes too well informed? In AA we should be very, very slow in making changes. Except in rare cases, there should be no rush.

Third- Has the vote been a substantial majority? If we have thirty-one members present, and the vote is sixteen to fifteen, then fifteen resentments walk out the door from that meeting. One of the Warranties of our Twelfth Concept states: "All decisions should be reached by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, substantial unanimity."

If these three conditions have been met, then we can truly say we have listened to a loving God expressing himself in our group conscience.

For me, AA is not a big corporation with offices in New York City. It's principally just my little home group. If one of our members becomes a big shot and starts passing out orders, we're going to have big problems. Our group could even break up because of it. And without that group, it would surely be back to the gutter for me.

'He Died Sober'

I had been dry in AA for only a few weeks when I heard an announcement at the beginning of a meeting that a fellow AA member had passed away.

"He died sober," was the closing comment.

This seemed to me crude and insensitive. How could the sum total of a person's life be summarized by that statement?

My sponsor encouraged me to attend the funeral service, if I could, and I found the eulogy even more shocking when the minister announced, with the family's permission, that the deceased had been a member of Alcoholics Anonymous, and that he had passed away "sober" with a number of years' continuous sobriety.

Eulogies are supposed to point out the good character of the deceased but at this service most of the emphasis was placed on the fact that the deceased had died sober. I didn't understand it. Why would the deceased, or his family, have wanted to publicly recognize the stigma and defeat of alcoholism? These AAs and their philosophy seemed to me to be a little bit on the strange side.

My sponsor said that if I stayed around the program of AA, more would be revealed. First I noted that none of the member's close friends seemed to be having a difficult time with his passing. No one got drunk. I was further surprised to hear the deceased's name mentioned at several meetings soon after, as members related incidents in his life. These stories often brought a large round of laughter and almost merriment.

When I questioned AAs on their attitude toward their deceased friend, they would smile and tell me to keep coming back. Nine years later, more has been revealed and I do now understand.

Alcoholics Anonymous is a spiritual program and offers to each member a daily reprieve from drinking. An alcoholic who dies sober, therefore has significant meaning in the AA program. This death is proof that the merciless obsession and physical craving for alcohol can be lifted if the AA member stays spiritually fit and lives the Twelve Steps of recovery.

Today there is no shock when I hear the words, "died sober." The real significance of AA members dying sober is that they are carrying the message of Alcoholics Anonymous on their final day.

LOVE

The truths came surely and rapidly in the class on love. In AA there is no recrimination and no lecturing of those who drink and then return. They are lovingly told, "There is no disgrace from falling. The only shame is not

getting back on your feet and trying again."

Our love is both the result of, and the motivation for, such emotions as humility, gratitude, honesty, faith, hope, tolerance, and trust. It produces togetherness and friendship. We find in our book that "patience, tolerance, understanding and love are the watchwords of our recovery."

How easy it was to find love in the words, "We can do what I can't" and "We alcoholics are people who need

people.

Long-timers suggested I do an act of love each day without boasting about it. That brought a lesson in humility for a guy who always wanted credit for things done - even some things I had little to do with.

Loving people remind us to "pray for the SOB" who angers us. We are told to live life with love for ourselves,

love for others, and love for life.

We really do learn much about love in AA. Love encourages us to count our blessings when we feel rejections, failures, inadequacies, and unworthiness. And life in AA is full of blessings.

It is easy. We learn to love the naturally lovable, but when we concentrate on loving those we think are

unlovable we find out how expansive love is.

As time passes in AA, we hear or read much about love: Love is as simple as becoming always available. Love is a sincere interest in others. Love is a desire to be of service. Giving love is more important than being loved. Love is an ability to understand others and their problems.

Love is always positive and constructive. It does not tolerate negativism. It must be given and received unconditionally, without reservations, with no strings attached. When we love, we will see in others what we wish to have in ourselves. We will know that love is a privilege given to us by God. When we love, we will never be bored with life or with our program. It is what impels us to be active and to get involved in service.

Love will teach us values in life. It shows us that the things that count are never held in the hand but always in the heart. And people who are loving always live in the now. They cannot afford to live in the past or project into tomorrow. People who love laugh more and believe that a day without laughter is a lost day. Love is the cement for the unity we need in AA. It joins the power of the mind and the heart for emotional growth. It promotes lasting attachments, never divisive controversy.

The love we find in AA is always warm, never cold. It is firm, not loose. Companionship is a result of love.

And love cannot be taught but is developed naturally.

Anything is possible if done with love. I'm sure that our big no-no - taking another's inventory - is justified if done with love to help someone avoid a slip.

If we ever doubt that love in AA does not bring unity, we can remind ourselves that most meetings end with a firm joining of hands and recital of the Lord's Prayer or the

Serenity Prayer.

One of my favorite stories is about two men who, on an evening stroll along a street, came upon an open door through which they stopped to look. Inside, an AA meeting was about to start. One man asked, "What do you suppose is going on in there?" The second man shrugged. "Must be a big family reunion. Everybody's hugging and kissing each other." Obliviously with love.

a new feeling... WE FOUND WE COULD DECIDE:

Right from the beginning of our association with AA, we begin to make decisions. When we first approach AA we are given the choice of trying what AA has to offer or continuing drinking, with the possibility of an early death or insanity. So we decide to try AA. We have made our first decision. Whether it was easy or not doesn't make much difference. The main thing is that we decided for ourselves. For a good many of us, it was our first real decision in years.

We decide we need what the meetings have to offer. So once again we have made a decision. At the meetings, we are again put in the position of deciding for ourselves just what we want to retain from all that is said. We decide, for ourselves alone, what we wish to accept or reject; we have been put in this position without realizing at the time just what we have done.

Along about this time, we become aware of the Twelve Steps. Do we want to give them a try or not? It is again our decision and perhaps it is a little difficult to decide if we care to use them in our daily life. But we try this part of AA, too, and find ourselves more and more contented and happy in our day by day living. AA is now a part of all our affairs.

Up until now, many of the decisions have been made and acted upon without the conscious knowledge on our part of having of having done so. It is as though our minds have begun to function and cause us to act subconsciously. That is one of the many mysteries of AA: How, without realizing it, we decide to do something about the problem that first brought us to AA.

As we find ourselves facing more and more problems, we begin looking to our Higher Power to help us make decisions, for all too often we find ourselves up against a brick wall when we try to find our own answers. This decision, I think, adds to our peace of mind and freedom from worry because we now have someone to turn to for help no matter how big or small our problem may be. Through decisions, we find ourselves growing in confidence, strength and faith, not only in ourselves, but also in our fellow man and in the Higher Power, which I choose to call GOD.

The primary world service leadership once exercised by the founders of A.A. must necessarily be assumed by the Trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous."

"No matter how carefully we design our service structure of principles and relationships, no matter how well we apportion authority and responsibility, the operating results of our structure can be no better than the personal performance of those who must man it and make it work. Good leadership cannot function well in a poorly designed structure....Weak leadership can hardly function at all, even in the best of structures."

Due to A.A.'s principle of rotation, furnishing our service structure with able and willing workers has to be a continuous effort...."Who are the best qualified people?" should be the thought of all.

No society can function well without able leadership in all its levels, and A.A. can be no exception...

"A leader in A.A. service is therefore a [person] who can

personally put principles, plans and policies into such dedicated and effective action that the rest of us want to back [them] and help [them] with [their] job.

"Good leadership will also remember that a fine plan or idea can come from anybody, anywhere. Consequently, good leadership will often discard its own cherished plans for others that are better, and it will give credit to the source.

"Good leadership never passes the buck. Once assured that it has, or can, obtain sufficient general backing, it freely takes decisions and puts them into action forthwith, provided of course that such actions be within the framework of its defined authority and responsibility.

"Another qualification for leadership is 'give and take,' the ability to compromise cheerfully whenever a proper compromise can cause a situation to progress in what appears to be the right direction.... We cannot, however, compromise always. Now and then, it is truly necessary to stick flat-footed to one's convictions about an issue until it is settled.

"Our leaders do not drive by mandate, they lead by example. We say to them, 'Act for us, but do not boss us."

One, Two, Three, Four

I was told that each person had to do the steps his or her own way. I'd been doing things my own way all my life. So, just once, I decided to try it their way — as it was done by those who contributed their experience, strength, and hope to the Big Book. But not until I had tried it my way first.

I came into AA with a deep-seated guilt complex that went back to the days when I would be sent to my room to await the strap. It seemed to me that when I enjoyed myself I was punished, and the waiting for that punishment to occur was worse than the strap itself. As I was growing up, I came to believe that if I enjoyed myself, punishment must follow. Most of this punishment was self-inflicted, because I couldn't stand waiting for the ax to fall.

So you can imagine how I felt when I first came to AA. I started to feel better, But I wondered how long it would last. I began to feel uneasy with my newfound sobriety—the waiting game again. When my sponsor told me I must do a fourth step, I grabbed the advice—and it was a disaster, nothing but self-flagellation. My Fifth Step only made me feel worse. Self-pity set in. But I didn't drink. I kept coming back. And when they asked me to be secretary of a step group, I willingly did so.

One night, we were talking about the Fourth Step. My eyes wandered from the speaker to the slogans. All of a sudden, I knew why my first year in AA had been so hard. Here is what I learned about the slogans and the Fourth Step.

WILLING TO BELIEVE

GIFT OF SOBRIETY

Each person follows an individual path, and mine was one of Alienation, in spite of my strong desire for acceptance. The "I" that I saw was not the "I" that others experienced. The result of this disharmony led inevitably toward an ever-increasing dissatisfaction with life. By 1960, I was hanging onto life, supported only by a thread of responsibility to my family. Misery was my constant companion.

It was at that time that I actively took the road toward alcoholism. There were still small fragments of hope, which prompted an occasional frenzy of activity toward betterment. But the results were always the same: disillusionment and thorough disgust with my world.

This feeling led to still another transformation—complete surrender to the idea of death. If the future became too difficult, there could always be suicide. But as long as things stayed on track, I was content to kill myself a drink at a time.

August 1975 marked the beginning of another life. A friend came to my house, related his alcoholic experiences, and dropped of the Big Book, along with an invitation to come to an AA meeting if I thought I was an alcoholic.

During the next ten days, out of curiosity and out of courtesy to my friend, I read the book and other AA material. I tried to apply it honestly to myself. Finally, I decided to attend a meeting.

Thus began the most important period of my life. The change was not instantaneous. It began as a trickle, became a stream, and was a veritable torrent by the end of the first week. I was bewildered and confused but never alraid. Joy alternated with serenity as I felt a great increase in God-consciousness.

The miracle did not manifest itself in spectacular Him. ways, but rather in the simple, mundane events of everyday life. To me, this very fact was wondrous. To see myself doing and saying things that would have been with completely alien to me the week before was indeed under miraculous.

AA's approach was practical; there was little theory here. This was a new way of life, which could work for me and could bring me, as a byproduct, the happiness I always sought. Moralizing has its place, for one must know the rules; but this new insight enabled me to feel the rules and to apply them in a workable, concrete way, moment by moment, each day. What greater gift could be given?

And it was a gift; it was completely undeserved. My only part in the process was complete surrender and a willing, open honesty, applied to the best of my ability. I knew the initial excitement would come to an end, but I felt no fear. I was given, not only renewed faith, but faith to a degree never before experienced. As long as I hold onto this, I know I will not lose my way.

Thus, I came to a second stage in the journey, the gradual acquiring of true self-knowledge. Seen in retrospect, the treatment seems very gentle. The curtain of not-knowing was drawn back a little at a time. Each measure of pain was accompanied by two measures of joy. Each painful incident I recalled, it now seemed, had been carefully contrived to drive home some major point. And always, there was the sustaining presence of God.

The third month was harder. The old self came to the fore again, Leading me back toward the swamp that had been my habitat. There was a series of mild depressions; but in each case, with the help of God, I was able to pinpoint the difficulty, and the depression was relieved.

Then came a deeper depression, one that in the old days would have meant the start of days or weeks of misery. I tried to apply what I had learned, but it didn't seem to work. Then, I remembered something I had read: Just as we were powerless over alcohol, so we are powerless to change ourselves by our own efforts alone. With this thought, the depression lifted and my peace of mind was restored. God had let me struggle with this burden to make me see that we are truly finite and helpless and that our place is to love, honor, and serve Him.

A further insight came at this time: Each trial can serve as the springboard to greater God-consciousness, with a corresponding increase in strength. I now understand that the tribulations of life are necessary to the growth process, and that only through these trials will I grow spiritually.

"Easy Does It": Don't be in too much of a rush, but do it.

"Think": Have I done Step One? Step Two? Step Three?

"Live and Let Live": Look at myself and not the other guy.

"First Things First": Whatever's good for my sobriety, which must come first, is good for me.

And, finally, "But for the Grace of God."

The last brings me to the reason I had to go back to Steps One, Two, and Three before I could Properly do a Fourth Step. I had to begin liking myself enough to want to *search* to get to know myself better. I had to turn my will and my life over to the care of God, as I understand Him, before I could Become *fearless* in the face of self-inventory. And I had to want to change so I might better do His will, not so I could feel better.

Today, I know that His will for me is working better than my will ever did. I am starting to have a fulfilled, happy life and can use my problems for instruction rather than destruction. The learning experience is never easy, but it is exhilarating, and as it says in the Big Book, my imagination is begging to be fired.

Thank you AA, for all of this. To all of you out there who are confused as I was: I hope my experience has helped you as much as it has helped me. May God bless you — and happy fourth · stepping!

MYSTERIOUS WAYS

After losing my career, family and health, I remained unconvinced that my way of life needed a second look. My drinking and other drug use were killing me, but I had never met a recovering person or an A.A. member. I thought I was destined to die alone and that I deserved it. At the peak of my despair, my infant son became critically ill with a rare disease. Doctors' efforts to help him proved useless. I redoubled my efforts to block my feelings, but now the alcohol had stopped working. I was left staring into God's eyes, begging for help. My introduction to A.A. came within days, through an odd series of coincidences, and I have remained sober ever since. My son lived and his disease is in

Living in the Moment

That "Formal" Step Five

In my first weeks of sobriety, I read through the Twelve Steps quickly and decided that anyone with half a wit could follow those simple suggestions without any trouble. But on approaching the Fifth Step, I began to have second thoughts. I could never tell another person some of the things I had done while I was drinking. If these newfound friends in AA really knew me, they would have nothing to do with me. So I'd just keep my mouth shut about the horrors of my past, I decided, and fake it.

Within months, I attempted my first Fifth Step. Inventory notebook in hand, I recited a list of venial offenses. Of overwhelming fear, gnawing guilt, and self-hatred, I said nothing. Faking a Step is not the same as taking a Step. Consequently, nothing extraordinary happened that day. I experienced defeat.

Failure is an integral part of learning, albeit a painful part. Just as alcohol had brought me to my knees and force-fed a drop of humility into my life, so did my first encounter with the Fifth Step. The introduction of humility deflated my alcoholic ego once again, and therein lay the key to success. Forced to surrender my idea of how the Fifth Step should be worked, I began to listen more closely at meetings. Hearing other members talk so freely, honestly, and realistically about their shortcomings made it easier to begin sharing my own. As a swimmer tests the water with his toe, so I began to share my defects slowly, cautiously. Always expecting rejection and disgust, I was relieved to find only understanding, acceptance, and support.

Like a Bump on a Log

If you're tired of just sitting there, try getting involved

Psychologists will tell you that the inclination to avoid responsibility is a characteristic of immaturity. If that is so, we would appear to live in an age of rampant immaturity. "Let's not get involved" is an expression frequently heard. If you witness a serious traffic accident and your statement might help the person who is not at fault, what is your reaction? Most people drive on, because they do not want the aggravation of involvement.

This trend runs the gamut of human happenings. Murders are being committed in the presence of scores of people, none of whom raises a finger. Part of it may be the instinct of self-preservation, but most

of it is the desire not to be involved.

What does this have to do with the AA way of life? As a group, we alcoholics suffer from immaturity somewhat more than most people. Fortunately, we become aware of this. But awareness alone, though it gives us an advantage over other people, is far from enough. We must act upon it. In our early AA years, most of us throw ourselves into this way of life and the Fellowship's activities. As we grow older in AA, many of us are inclined to pull back, and we may reach a stage of aloofness from activity. Leading meetings and doing Twelfth Step work are jobs for those in their first five years of sober living - that is the rationalization.

The person who drifts away and finally loses sobriety itself is a typical casualty of this procedure. Even those who maintain sobriety are pathetic figures. They are not happy in it. The one who sits like a bump on a log at an occasional meeting and says, "I don't seem to get much out of the Fellowship any more" is reflecting another result of inactivity or, to put it more clearly, noninvolvement.

This is a program of involvement. When we stop giving generously of ourselves in the vital, living, moving program of AA, we are dead ducks in terms of happy sober living. Fortunately, most dead ducks can

be revived if they are willing.

Remember, the Twelfth Step says, "carry this message to alcoholics." That doesn't mean merely alcoholics who still drink. It means our fellow AAs, too. Shouldn't some of us old-timers hunt up other old-timers we seldom see any more, and somehow try to get them really involved with us? They all have a lot to give, and only through new involvement will they start to receive again. Anonymous, Cleveland, Ohio Grapevine June, 1976

We looked at them together, discarded the guilt and remorse, and decided where amends were due. Some months later, I took the big dive: that "formal" Fifth Step I had heard so much about. For five hours, my sponsor and I sat in his living room and talked. This was not session of breast-beating or flagellation; rather, it was an honest sharing of hopes, fears, past mistakes, and realistic plans for self-improvement. Of course, there was talk of resentment, guilt, lust, jealousy, and the like; but there was also sharing of happiness, joy, gratitude, and love.

None of the Twelve Steps is an exercise in self-destruction. An honest Fifth Step is ego-deflating, yes. But only through the essential humility it provides can I begin to grow mentally, emotionally, and spiritually into the person my God would have me become.

At the Turning Point

Last night, I attended my regular Thursday night meeting, which happened to be chaired by my husband, also a recovering alcoholic.

The subject he chose was taken right from "How It Works," and it was simply the words "We stood at the turning point." I had to reflect then on my own early days in A.A. and my

personal turning point.

On the day of my last drink, at the end of a three-week drunk, I had what I can describe only as a crucial awakening: the revelation that if I took one more drink, I would die. For the first time in thirteen years, I did not want to die. This time, though, I knew I would if I did not stop drinking.

Being very sick and very frightened, I called for help, and I was helped at our alcoholism unit in a local hospital. The doctor in charge and the counseling staff were recovering AAs, and outside AAs came in to help us patients

learn the AA ways.

I heard some of these AAs talking about the Fourth and Fifth Steps, not necessarily recommending them to us newcomers, just telling us how and why they worked so well. The Steps sounded frightening and foreboding.

I had gone to the unit with enormous amounts of fear, guilt, and remorse - secrets I had hidden for years, no longer trusting anyone with any part of myself. And I knew that no one trusted or accepted me, either. I had become too ashamed to even tell anyone that I hurt, because I thought they would not care. Somehow, I knew that if I went home with all my secrets still secret, I would not stay sober. Now, I wanted to be sober. So, frightening as these two Steps sounded, I decided I would try to work them.

I went to my room and wrote. I put on the paper every piece of guilt, fear, and transgression I could remember. It took a few hours. Not realizing I should look for pluses, I wrote only the terrible things.

I then took my paper and went to tell it all to one of the counselors, who, as I stated, was an AA member. I did tell her everything, and she shared parts of her life with me, pointing out common traits and feelings. Especially, she showed me how we had both coped with life by running from it through alcohol.

When we were through, she looked at me with the same acceptance that she had given me before I had said a word. Her acceptance of me opened the door to acceptance of myself and told me, without words, that I really was all right. I know today that her nonjudgmental attitude is a quality shared by most AAs, and that she had learned it through

her own use of the Twelve Steps.

What I could see then was that my first, crude Fourth and Fifth Steps had set me free from my lifelong guild and unrealistic fear. They began a new way of life, with honesty as its essential base. They created hope out of my hopeless disease. Since that time, six and a half years ago, I have worked many Fourth and Fifth Steps. Today, the good stands out clearly; in most cases, it outshines the bad. Today, the only secrets I keep belong to others or are facts that could be harmful to someone. I have nothing of my own to hide. I share both with my AA husband and with my friends in the Fellowship.

But it was my original sharing with a very special lady that was my own turning point.



Recovery: The Base for Service

For a recent meeting, we scheduled as speakers some concerned local general service representatives (GSRs) to talk about the AA group. We read from the pamphlet "The AA Group" and started discussing experiences and problems. Much was shared and learned.

One of our members, Car, said, "I've been involved in our group for five years. During that time, four of us have done all the work, rotating jobs occasionally among ourselves. There are usually thirty to forty people on hand every week, but no one else will get involved. We've tried making announcements, giving pep talks, and even shaming people into helping, but nothing has worked so far. What can we do?"

Angela's answer was short and simple. She said, "Encourage good sponsorship." This wisdom was from the lips of someone relatively new.

I think Angela indicated a good way to get people involved. I've been sober for eight years, through the grace of God and the Twelve Steps of this beautiful Fellowship. During these years, I've been involved, as my sponsor was, in group service, intergroup service, and area general service, with a variety of jobs. During these jobs, I have become very confused over some things going on that did not appear to be good AA. I've heard people new to service say, "It's just a bunch of politics down there." I want to help, but also do not want to be a part of something negative, I've had a hard time explaining to a new person how I've grown with service and avoided difficulties.

What Angela implied in her short statement was: "The best service is always based in the best recovery." I am a grateful, sober alcoholic. I am willing to pass on to someone new the things that helped me get sober, i.e., the Twelve Steps. I'd better be willing to give it away if I want to keep it. But how about the growth that I've gotten in working for my group? And the good feeling of finally putting something into the AA pot instead of constantly taking out? I am not willing to lose these, either, so I give it away. If I love the alcoholic I'm sponsoring, I will give him everything good that has been given to me and share with him some of my upsetting experiences, to help him grow.

The way I've handled the slighting remarks about service is to remind myself that I am recovered alcoholic first, before any job I happen to be doing. A friend of mine says, "The highest up you can get in AA is sober." Another friend of mine always ties in his recovery during his service talks. I try to remind myself that if I am grateful, I will try to give it away even in circumstances that seem negative. Bill W., our co-founder, said, "Sometimes, the good is the enemy of the best." I love AA and want it to have the best, even if that takes some patience and tolerance on my part. I believe if we want the best service, we must start with the best recovery we are capable of. continued on page 11

Essence of AA

Defects

There is a direct relationship between our nature--our general makeup or character--and our alcoholism. Our defects and our necessity to start drinking are closely intermingled. When this is a recognized, our need for the Twelve Steps becomes evident.

Resentments

When resentments are discussed at AA meetings, there is usually evidence that people confuse them with the more common annoyances and irritations that beset our daily lives. It should be understood that resentments are not instantaneous nor short-lived.

Our certain ingredient of a resentment is that the injured feeling stays with us for some time. We nurse it. We hold on to it. Indeed, we do not want to be deprived of our right to stew in it.

Another ingredient is the desire to get even--to square accounts or to humiliate the enemy in some fashion. This type of resentment is a mental and spiritual cancer that consumes you and has no effect on your enemy. If, the feeling, I offer you an almost surefire solution. When next you talk to your Higher Power through the Lord's Prayer and you say, "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us," just add the words "except Joe Blow."

That should convince you of your hypocrisy. If not, carry it a step further to God's certain answer: "In that case, Bud, that means I can forgive all *except* you."

Humility

Humility is simply getting yourself into proper perspective in your relations with God and your fellowman. This involves both your importance and your unimportance in the total picture. It is just as wrong to accept always being wrong as it is to expect always to be right.

Humility must not be associated with weakness or doormats. Humility is the source of supreme strength.

Humility is as worthy an objective in prayer as serenity. My humility prayer goes like this: "God grant me the humility to understand both my importance and unimportance in my relations with You and my fellowman, and to have the wisdom to know which is which, when.

CHARACTER: One of the attributes or features that make up and distinguish the individual.

DEFECT: An imperfection that impairs worth or utility.

Then and Now

At a meeting last night, another light bulb went on, to illuminate yet another facet of myself as I recover in the AA of the incidents that proved this to me happened in May, program.

Our group secretary choose "Freedom" as the topic for discussion. As the first person commented, a new idea took shape in my mind. I have attended other meetings where this was discussed, and the comparison was always made between the "then" drinking days and the "now" recovering days, with emphasis on the ability to move from the smallness of our world that was ruled by alcohol, into an openness of movement, free of real and imagined fears.

My light bulb allowed me to see for the first time that long before I added alcohol to my personality, I had been captive of resentment, fear, self-centeredness, and dishonest thinking. I had not known I possessed these character defects, so I permitted them to influence choices and decisions I made. I even found myself doing right things for the wrong reasons, and was a slave to the opinions of been that I would die and not one soul would attend my others.

To this personality, I added alcohol and created an even worse state of mind. Being an accomplished rationalizer and justifier, I was able to adjust my values to suit my actions. I became even more adept at dishonesty, was chained to fear, drudged away at the care and feeding of resentment, and allowed self-centeredness to shackle me as no Simon Legree ever could have.

Only after coming into AA, bottoming out, and admitting my powerlessness over alcohol was I able to go on and, primarily through the Fourth step, learn the exact nature of my wrongs and how they had influenced all of my life, before and during my years of drinking. With the Sixth Step, I realized that I had to bottom out on these defects. admitting powerlessness over them also, in order to progress. True freedom came only after I became willing to let God remove these defects of character from me, in order to give me not only openness of movement but also openness of mind and of spirit.

Today, through the humility learned in Step Six and the discipline afforded by all the steps, I have freedom unlike any I've ever experienced. Freedom from "the bondage of self," as expressed in the third Step prayer in the Big Book, is the most valued, in spite of the constant vigilance and prayer necessary to maintain it.

Had I not become alcoholic and been led to this fellowship, I might have spent the rest of my life in dreary drudgery, ignorant of the necessity to change or the resources available to help me change. Bless the changes!

A LESSON IN HUMILITY

God, as I understand Him, has a sense of humor. One when I was asked to say a few words at our church service on Mother's Day.

As soon as I began thinking about it, "a few words" became a sermon. After a few short hours, the sermon(which still had to be written) became one of the best sermons ever heard in our church. In a few days, as I started working on the sermon, it became probably the best sermon ever heard in North Bay. And as the week passed, it was quite possible that I would be asked to give several other sermons in our church. As a result, of course, people from other churches would come to hear me. When the moment for my "sermon" actually arrived, God in His mercy and wisdom stepped in. I developed the most awful thirst, beyond anything I'd ever suffered when I was drinking. I started my talk, but had to keep interrupting it every second sentence or so to take a drink. The water didn't quench that thirst. And soon, as the thirst deepened, I was drinking more than I was talking. I felt an almost overwhelming temptation to toast the congregation with a "Here's mud in your eye" toss of the glass.

And then the light came on. The message came through. God was telling me, " you are an alcoholic. That is all you are. Not a preacher, not a teacher, not a speaker. Just an alcoholic, recovering by my grace."

And that was that. A lesson taught with humor. A lesson I must never forget: The important thing is not what I do or where I live or what my name is; the important thing is that I am a recovering alcoholic, by the grace of God, through membership in A.A. North Bay Ontario







Welcome to my home — Thank you for my life!

In our first conversation I bore down heavily on the medical hopelessness of Dr. Bob's case, freely using Dr. Silkworth's words describing the alcoholic's dilemma, the "obsession plus allergy" theme. Though Bob was a doctor, this was news to him, bad news. Always better versed in spiritual matters than I, he had paid little attention to that aspect of my story. Even though he could not make them work, he already knew what the spiritual answers were. What really did hit him hard was the medical business, the verdict of inevitable annihilation. And the fact that I was an alcoholic and knew what I was talking about from personal experience made the blow a shattering one.

... it was not any spiritual teaching of mine, rather it was those twin ogres of madness and death, the allergy plus the obsession, that triggered him into a new life. It was Dr. Silkworth's idea, confirmed by William James, that struck him at great depth.

You see, our talk was a completely *mutual* thing. I had quit preaching. I knew that I needed this alcoholic as much as he needed me. *This was it*... This was how to carry the message.

AA's Tradition of Self-Support

AA's far-flung Twelfth Step activities, carrying the message to the next sufferer, are the very lifeblood of our AA adventure. Without this vital activity, we would soon become anemic; we would literally wither and die.

Now where do AA's services-worldwide, area. local-fit into our scheme of things? Why should we provide these functions with money? The answer is simple Every single AA service is designed to make more and better Twelfth Step work possible, whether it be a group meeting place, a central or intergroup office to arrange hospitalization and sponsorship, or the World Service Headquarters [now the General Service Office] to maintain unity and effectiveness all over the globe.

Though not costly, these service agencies are absolutely essential to our continued expansion-to our survival as a Fellowship. Their costs are a collective obligation that rests squarely upon all of us. Our support of services actually amounts to a recognition on our part that AA must everywhere function in full strength-and that, under our Tradition of self-support, we are all going

to foot the bill.

We have long known that Alcoholics Anonymous has no need for charitable contributions from any source. Our Fellowship is self-supporting. Neither do AA groups try to meet the rehabilitation expenses of thousands of newcomers. Long ago we learned that that was impractical.

Instead, AA offers to the new person a spiritual way of life that can eliminate the alcohol problem. With this accomplished, the new person, in the company of his fellow sufferers, can then begin the solution of his personal

problems-including the financial one.

So AA groups themselves accept no charitable funds—and give none away. At first glance, this attitude may seem to be hard-nosed, even callous. An immense experience tells us otherwise. Money gifts—as a prerequisite of getting sober—are usually worthless when

made a function of an AA group.

Of course, we see AA's primary charity in the Twelfth Step activities of tens of thousands of us as we daily carry the AA message to newcomers. We travel millions of miles; we absent ourselves from business and home. In the aggregate, we lay out very large sums. As individuals, we do not hesitate to give temporary financial aid to the newcomer, if and when he seems to want sobriety first. Here, then, is money charity aplenty, always given on a very personal, face-to-face basis. And perhaps even this cannot be called wholly charitable, since every Twelfth Step effort means more certain sobriety and added spiritual growth for the sponsor.

Both these principles we understand: that AA wants, no charity; that we support our own services. understand—but we sometimes forget.

The average member does not, I suppose, spend more than five minutes a day in prayer, asking and thanking for help to keep sober. He is awake about sixteen hours a day, approximately 1000 minutes. He is therefore paying out a premium of five units for 1000, that is, one-half of one percent.

The United States Congress passed a law that one-half of one percent of alcohol in a drink did not render that drink an intoxicating one. No one need fear that this amount of prayer will render anyone spiritually intoxicated or lead to religious mania.

SINGLENESS OF PURPOSE

a letter from a member to the fellowship:

I recently completed the Eighth Step and have decided that my first amends should be to Alcoholics Anonymous itself, which I believe I have harmed to some extent by violating its singleness of purpose.

I used to identify myself as an alcoholic and addict. I do not anymore because I now believe other addictions are irrelevant at AA meetings. But, aside from that, I also used to insist on talking about my other addictions beyond what was necessary to relate them to alcohol. I justified this by saying that alcohol was just another drug, and so it was unfair to expect me not to talk about all my addictions. And refused to attend any other fellowship, because I claimed to prefer the wisdom and sobriety in AA.

I realize now how rude and self-centered this position was. It is not a question of what is fair or whether alcohol is just another drug. The Traditions and primary purpose of AA are what they are

whether I agree with them or not.

In the past, when I was active, I often had dinner at the homes of people who did not use drugs, but who did drink. I never considered insisting that I had the right to smoke a joint at their dinner table because they were drinking wine. And imagine if I had, and then added insult to injury by saying: "And not only do I have a right to use any drug I want to around here if you're going to drink, but I'm going to keep coming back and I'm going to keep using any drug I want to in your home because I like the food you serve and your company better than the food and company I find in the homes of my drug addict friends. And I have a right to do this because all drugs are the same and I don't care what the rules or customs of your home are."

Such a gross abuse of hospitality sounds Warranty Fivepreposterous, but that is essentially what I was doing by insisting that I had a right to violate AA's singleness of purpose. I was abusing the hospitality Warranty Six-

of this Fellowship.

This is not an apology. I was too sick to realize how selfishly I was acting, and a mere apology is not necessarily an amends. I am hoping to amend the harm I did by stating clearly what I did, for the benefit of others, and, further, by not doing it again. H.D. New Medford, New Jersey Grapevine- August 1993

Warranty Two-

Sufficient operating funds, plus an ample Reserve, should be its prudent financial responsibility.

Warranty Three-

None of the Conference members shall ever b placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others.

Warranty Four-

That all important decisions be rea hed by discussion, vote, and, whenever possible, by substantial unanimity.

That no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy.

That thought the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in action and in spirit.

'Persons we had harmed'

In mental preparation of my Eight Step list, I discovered that some names came to mind naturally. In most instances, we want to change for the better where our children and family are concerned.

However, I found there were other people I did *not* want to make amends to, people I hold some resentments toward—so I impulsively concluded they didn't deserve any amends. I have to keep in mind that had I behaved in a more reasonable manner, they might not have responded as they did. If the circumstances had been reversed, I might have taken the same action they choose. I have to allow others to make mistakes and be human. Harboring resentments because of something others did is, in effect, imposing my upon them. By imposing my standards upon them, I am trying to assume God's role. I must realize I am not responsible for the actions of others, whether I approve of them or not. If I take on that task, I am passing judgment on them for reacting in a way that is unacceptable to *me*. I am taking their inventory.

In this Step, it states that we "became willing to make amends." This implies that there is going to be some conscious effort on my part to make all the needed amends. Those that come easy, to my old way of reasoning, would be an excellent stopping point. Yet the Step says we became willing to make amends to all those we had harmed. In going to these other people, I don't believe I need to apologize for being human; rather, I simply need to acknowledge that I was at fault and humbly ask them to pardon me. I do not need to make amends on my hands and knees; I need to walk tall, without false pride. When I go in humility and sincerely ask people to forgive me, this will remove the burden from my shoulders. They, too, may have been at fault, but I am neither their God nor their conscience. I am responsible only for myself.

For me, this Step offers two features: I am being responsible, by owning up to my wrongs and making amends for them; at the same time, I accept others as they are, regardless of what they did, or of what they may do when I go to them to make amends.

It's a Step with a double feature. When doing it, we make a double play. After finishing it, we receive double indemnity. Our reward is two for the price of one.

-Group Contributions in the month of August '95 One of my lifelong hostilities used to be directed squarely at fraternal associations, societies, and all other kinds of organizations. It seems to have stemmed from the fact that I could not bear being told what to do or how to do it. Besides that, drinking or not, I never understood what was going on. When people talked about purposes and goals, my mind would go blank.

When I had my last drink, in 1960, and began attending meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous, I came in contact with so many people that I was sure AA would turn out to be just another big organization. If so, that meant bosses, competition, and favoritism, a troika I had never been able to deal with successfully. I feared that my newfound sobriety would be short-lived.

But if AA was organized, I could not account for the absence of pressures that are regularly built into organizational structures. For example, nobody approached me with a membership application blank. Nobody told me which group to join or that I had to join any group. Once I had joined, there was no arm-twisting as to how to vote at group elections.

My first awareness of any structure in AA was in my own home group. It came at a time when we were obliged to look for new quarters. What a lot of planning was required. It was just like hunting for an apartment or a house. What part of town did we want to be in? What was the minimum space requirement? How high a rent or contribution were we able to pay?

Once we were reestablished, the group's activities got under way again. On meeting night, the door had to be unlocked and the AA sign hung out. The hospitality chairman had to see to refreshments, setting up the room, and greeting members. All the other officers at group level had their jobs to do: the local intergroup delegate, the institutions representative, the Grapevine representative, and the general service representative.

That's quite a lot of organizing, calling for organizational know-how! Yet I cannot imagine my group's functioning for long without it or something very much like it.

Does that mean that my group is flouting the Ninth Tradition? I don't think so. The Tradition's reference is to the organizing of AA as a whole in a hierarchical, or governmental, sense. It has been my observation that groups practicing the principle of rotation usually have no trouble with the Ninth Tradition.

LACK OF MEETINGS = NEGATIVE ATTITUDES

I have been sober in AA for nearly five years, and a great deal

has happened since my first meeting.

I tried to follow the Steps to the best of my ability for the first few years. I was working at a menial job, which yielded a menial paycheck. I was single and living with three other people in a run-down house in a university town. My car was old and barely running. My social life outside of AA was nonexistent,

and my future looked pretty grim.

But I was told to get on my knees each day and thank God for a sober day. I was told that the lively social life, the new cars, the fancy apartments, the prestigious jobs did not matter. What did matter was that I did not pick up one drink for one day and was grateful for my new-found physical, mental, and spiritual

I practiced being grateful each day. I say "practiced" because, when I was an active alcoholic, my attitude and disposition had never been predisposed to being grateful and positive. So I practiced saying the words, and pretty soon I began to believe

Several years went by, and my life took amazing turns. I returned to school and, by the grace of God, was able to earn a master's degree. Again by the grace of God, I met and married a wonderful man who is also a recovering alcoholic. I acquired a new job, and I went to live in the house that I had always

I wish I could say that I lived happily ever after. But I soon encountered severe problems, all of which were a consequence of my attitude. I allowed my job to take precedence over AA principles, and in a short time, I was returning from work with self-pity and negative attitudes reminiscent of my old drunken self. I put the job and other materialistic elements above my sobriety. I snapped at my husband, cut back on meetings, closed the Big Book, and refrained from calling my sponsor.

One day, I came home from work with extreme anxiety, a nervous stomach, and a desire to escape. Translated, all of that means "drink." Then, I remembered something that my husband once said at a meeting: "Anything you put before your sobriety,

you're going to lose.

Thank God, I remembered that. (If I hadn't, my husband would have reminded me.) I see now that mundane things are nice, but certainly not necessary to make me kind, serene and sober. My priorities were surely out of whack. I forgot from whence I came.

I hope that from now on I will be able to maintain the proper attitude and order of business in life: AA first, all else second.

Rotation, one of the blessed safeguards of our fellowship, applies not only to groups but to central offices and intergroups, committees, and board. It provides for limited terms of office, thus assuring the next person the same chance at recovery that we had. It is also designed to help us keep the emphasis on the principles before personalities by avoiding the trap of thinking we are the only ones who can do a given job. Rotation is also applied to staff assignments at GSO (the AA General Service Office). In that way, no one staff member becomes the expert on a given subject; the whole staff becomes that much more familiar with our society's problems and their solutions; and our fellowship gains in the end.

Rotation applies throughout our general service structure. The levels of the structure start with the group and moves by stages to the General Service Conference. From there, they move back to the group, the solid basis from which all general or worldwide service proceeds. A capsule picture of this structure might be in order here.

If a group wants to have a representative at the conference, it elects a GSR (general service representative).

GSRs in a given district elect a DCM (district committee member). The DCMs from a given area form the area committee, where among other activities, problems affecting the membership are gathered to be brought to the conference. Once every two years, the GSRs and the DCMs come together in an area assembly to elect an area delegate. The delegate brings his or her area problems to the Conference but is not there solely to represent one area. Each delegate's actions and voting will be directed toward the best interests of AA as a whole.

The General Service Conference meets annually in New York. Groups in the United States and Canada send 91 delegates, via area assemblies, to discuss AA business. Conference discussion and its resulting Advisory Actions cover an extraordinarily wide range of subjects. Other members of the conference are the General Service Board (trustees), the GSO and Grapevine staffs, and the boards of AA World Services, Inc., and the Grapevine, Inc.

Here is a very important note about the conference. In The AA Service Manual, Bill W. wrote that "while the

conference can issue orders to the General Service Office, it can never mandate or govern the Society of Alcoholics

Anonymous which it serves. The Conference represents us, but cannot rule us."

GSO is located in New York. One of the multitude of services it provides is to coordinate and arrange the annual conference. A trip to GSO is a memorable occasion for AAs visiting New York from all parts of the world.

Some of us (and I used to be one) have trouble with the facts that the AA Grapevine, which publishes our monthly magazine, is incorporated and AA World Services, which publishes our Conference-approved literature, is also incorporated. I used to cite those two organizations as proof positive that AA was indeed organized. With time, I came to recognize that we as AAs do not exist in a vacuum—that we are subject to local and state laws. By complying with those laws and incorporating as legal entities, both the Grapevine and AAWS vastly improved their capability of serving us, which is the only reason for their existence in the first place.

The Ninth Tradition is concerned primarily with our fellowship as a whole. But it does have a personal application, too. I must have order in my personal life, and I am willing to go to any length to secure it. The achievement of one of my paramount desires, peace of mind, seems to come about as a direct result of discipline (self-organization) in my thinking, in my emotional views, and in my spiritual outlook. My sobriety depends on the well-being and the good, orderly direction of those several aspects of my makeup.

I gained a fresh view of the Traditions one evening when I was scheduled to speak at an AA meeting. Because I had not planned my time carefully, I had to rush, and my thoughts were scattered when I arrived at the group. I heard myself say to the chairman, "Please give me a minute to get myself organized."

Some of us clung to the claim that when drinking we never hurt anybody but ourselves. Our families didn't suffer, because we always paid the bills and seldom drank at home. Our business associates didn't suffer, because we were usually on the job. Our reputations didn't suffer, because we were certain few knew of our drinking. Those who did would sometimes assure us that, after all, a lively binder was only a good man's fault. What real harm, therefore, had we done? No more, surely, than we could easily mend with a few casual apologies.

This attitude, of course, is the end result of purposeful forgetting. It is an attitude which can be changed only by a deep and honest search of our motives and actions.

A DAY WITHOUT REGRETS

Intil someone suggested I write an article about Step Ten, I had not been aware that this is not really one of my favorite Steps. For one thing, it's so daily.

It's easier to admit powerlessness, to come to believe, to make a decision, to make a list—do some major cleanup on oneself, then move on to bigger and better things like carrying the message and writing instructive articles explaining the program to people who may not be catching all the nuances because they aren't as bright as I am.

It's okay to admit privately that a lot one's past behavior was counterproductive to a rich, fulfilling life, and then to confess as much in dramatic or pitiful or humorous cadences. But to go through all this every day! To cast a judicious eye over how you have comported yourself, not in the past, but in the *present*, trying to be honest about what have done this day!

No wonder this is not a Step I've pondered over frequently. It's one thing to be brave about the Fourth Step. After all, that deals with the *past*. The defects that began to loom up out of the alcohol-saturated mists of my history—such as irresponsibility toward duties I had freely accepted, nay, actually sought, insensitivity, not to say blindness, about how my actions were affecting others—well, all those failings were due to the effect of alcohol on my brain. Weren't they?

After a while, however, this pesky Step makes you wonder a little. One year, five years, ten--without a drop of alcohol to muddle and distort my mental processes -- and I still thought mostly in terms of "Will this course of action interfere with my comfort and pleasure?" rather than, "Am I selfishly hurting someone else for the sake of an ephemeral few moments of personal ego gratification?"

Because, now, it is me, not booze, that causes me to conduct myself in ways that leave me feeling ashamed, and which often rebound to my own disadvantage by alienating people with whom I need to be on good terms. Furthermore, there seems to be a consensus in Alcoholics Anonymous that one's own psychological makeup predisposed one toward drinking to excess in the first place and that only by working oneself out of those traits of character can one be reasonably certain never again to have to undergo the horror of waking up debilitated, dehydrated, aching, and in despair

The whole thing was also sometimes complicated by the fine line between faults and virtues. What is necessary and good for my own individual survival often conflicts with what is necessary to the functioning of whatever group of human beings I happen to be dependent on and without whom I could not survive at all

When under the influence of alcohol I may have frequently acted as if I believed I could stand apart from the rest of society, catering to and pursuing only my own individual wishes and wants. But even then I was not so cupid that I did not intellectually comprehend the saying "no man is an island." In Alcoholics Anonymous this truth was spelled out for me, not in words and precepts, but in the actual processes of changing from a "drinking woman" to a total abstainer.

Not knowing that it was a common remark upon joining AA, in my first week I told a friend, "I've rejoined the human race." You see, I already knew that to survive individually I had to become a functioning part of the rest of humanity. AA was the starting point. So what happens? I learned that being able to live with others without too much discomfort required continuing to take personal inventory and when I was wrong promptly admitting it.

At first I was so confused about my own ethical values that I couldn't tell the difference between moral cowardice and kindly forbearance, a need to control born out of insecurity and a healthy self-protectiveness, between a thorough con job on myself and an honest analysis of my motivations. In fact, many times in looking back at a given day all I could be sure I had done right was not take a drink.

I had to start cautiously, depending on the source of truth flourishing somehow, somewhere in the cells and molecules of my body to guide me through this labyrinth of "right" and "wrong." "Right" was always not taking a rink. That I could be sure of. "Wrong" was more nebulous, beginning with rather simple "faults," like monopolizing conversations, not listening thoughtfully to the views of others because my brain was so burstingly full of my own convictions that there was not room to store their erroneous ideas for later judicious consideration, demonstrating audibly and visibly emotions of anger and pain induced by the behavior of my loved ones, regardless of how my performance affected them.

I wish I could say that in the twenty-four years I have been a member of AA I had always recognized and admitted these defects. But I can't. All I can claim is that they don't occur as often as they once did and that when they do, they have moderated.

To someone new to sobriety, let me interpolate a warning here. Don't take the above inadequate list of my surface defects as a reference point for your own faults. It may well be that you won't enter a conversation at all, that you rarely have the courage to express an opposing point of view, that you almost never let either loved or disliked persons get a glimpse of how you really feel, good or bad. While I tend to create harm by overdoing on these counts, you may be cheating yourself and others by under-doing elf-expression.

Only you can get to really know yourself. That's what makes this Tenth Step such a toughie. You have to do it yourself

Many times I have regretted dragging my feet on Step

Ten I could have saved myself a lot of regrets if I had been more conscientious about it. But, even so, I have been, I think, a more creditable human being than I was before I joined AA.

In fact, as I now write it is 1 30 in the afternoon, and I tell you honestly I don't think I've done anything wrong yet today. Of course, I haven't been out of the house yet and so haven't had a chance to tangle with another flawed human being. However, I hope that at 11 00 this evening, when I turn out the light, I shall still be able to look back at this day without regrets.

DROWNING

Pefore my commitment to a state alcoholic center, I had had a dry stint in Alcoholics Anonymous. I know now that I had gone to A.A. to save my marriage, job, and liver, though no one could have convinced me at the time that I hadn't sought A.A. with all the proper motives. In seven months, my liver got well, and I got drunk for six weeks, winding up at the center.

On my eighth night there, I knew that I was dying I was so weak that I could hardly breathe, my breath came in little gasps, quite far apart. If a drink had been put within an inch of my hand, I wouldn't have had the strength to take it. For the first time in my life, I was backed into a corner that I could not fight, cheat, lie, steal, or buy my way out of I was trapped. For the first time in my life, I uttered a sincere prayer "God, please help me." I didn't bargain with Him, nor did I suggest how or when He should help

Immediately, I became calm and relaxed. There was no flash of lightning or clap of thunder, not even a still, small voice. I was scared I didn't know what had happened. But I went to sleep and slept all night. When I awakened the next morning, I was refreshed, strong, and hungry. But the most wonderful thing was that, for the first time in my life, that dark, mysterious cloud of fear was gone. My first thought was to write to my wife about this experience, and I did. Imagine being able to write a letter after the condition I had been in the night before!

I am sure that some would classify this experience as an example of "letting go and letting God." Not this self-willed character! I had held on to the thin strand of my will until it just snapped, and then I was caught up by the "everlasting arms." I had to be rendered helpless, just like a drowning man who fights his rescuer

I returned to A.A., but I was reluctant for a long time to tell of my experience. I was afraid that no one would believe me and that they would laugh. Later, I learned that others had had similar experiences.

A spiritual experience, I think, is what God does for a man when the man does through his willingness to have his life transformed by following a proven program of spiritual growth, and this is a never ending venture.

What Is Acceptance?

ONE WAY TO GET AT the meaning of the principle of acceptance is to meditate upon it in the context of AA's much-used prayer: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference."

Essentially, this is to ask for the resources of grace by which we may make spiritual progress under all conditions. Greatly emphasized in this wonderful prayer is a need for the kind of wisdom that discriminates between the possible and the impossible. We shall also see that life's formidable array of pains and problems will require many different degrees of acceptance as we try to apply this valued principle.

Sometimes, we have to find the right kind of acceptance for each day. Sometimes, we need to develop acceptance for what may come to pass tomorrow and, yet again, we shall have to accept a condition that may never change. Then, too, there frequently has to be a right and realistic acceptance of grievous flaws within ourselves and serious faults within those about us -- defects that may not be fully remedied for years, if ever.

All of us will encounter failures, some retrievable and some not. We shall often meet with defeat -- sometimes by accident, sometimes self-inflicted, and at still other times dealt to us by the injustice and violence of other people. Most of us will meet up with some degree of worldly success, and here the problem of the right kind of acceptance will be really difficult. Then there will be illness and death. How indeed shall we be able to accept all these?

It is always worthwhile to consider how grossly that good word "acceptance" can be misused. It can be warped to justify nearly every brand of weakness, nonsense, and folly. For instance, we can "accept" failure as a chronic condition, forever without profit or remedy. We can also "accept" worldly success pridefully, as something wholly of our own making. We can also "accept" illness and death as certain evidence of a hostile and godless universe. With these twistings of acceptance, we AA's have had vast experience. Hence, we constantly try to remind ourselves that these perversions of acceptance are just gimmicks for excuse-making: a losing game at which we are, or at least have been, the world's champions.

This is why we treasure our Serenity Prayer so much. It brings a new light to us that can dissipate our old-time and nearly fatal habit of fooling ourselves. In the radiance of this prayer, we see that defeat, rightly accepted, need be no disaster. We now know that we do not have to run away, nor ought we again try to overcome adversity by still another bulldozing power drive that can only push up obstacles before us faster than they can be taken down.

On entering AA, we become the beneficiaries of a very different experience. One new way of staying sober is literally founded upon the proposition that "Of ourselves, we are nothing, the Father doeth the works." In steps One and Two of our recovery program, these ideas are specifically spelled out: "We admitted we were powerless over alcohol -- that our lives had become unmanageable" and "Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity." We couldn't lick alcohol with our own remaining resources, and so we accepted the further fact that dependence upon a Higher Power (if only our AA group) could do this hitherto impossible job.

The moment we were able to fully accept these facts, our release from the alcohol compulsion had begun. For most of us, this pair of acceptances had required a lot of exertion to achieve. Our whole treasured philosophy of self-sufficiency had to be cast aside. This had not been done with old-fashioned willpower; it was instead a matter of developing the willingness to accept these new facts of living. We neither ran nor fought. But accept we did. And then we were free. There had been no irretrievable disaster.

This kind of acceptance and faith is capable of roducing 100 percent sobriety. In fact, it usually does; and it must, else we could have no life at all. But the moment we carry these attitudes into our emotional problems, we find that only relative results are possible. Nobody can, for example, become completely free from fear, anger, and pride. Hence, in this life we shall attain nothing like perfect humility and love. So we shall have to settle, respecting most of our problems, for a very gradual progress, punctuated sometimes by heavy setbacks. Our old-time attitudes of "all or nothing" will have to be abandoned.

Therefore, our very first problem is to accept our present circumstances as they are, ourselves as we are, and the people about us as they are. This is to adopt a realistic humility without which no genuine advance can even begin. Again and again, we shall need to return to that unflattering point of departure. This is an exercise in acceptance that we can profitably practice every day of our lives. Provided we strenuously avoid turning these realistic surveys of the facts of life into unrealistic alibis for apathy or defeatism, they can be the sure foundation upon which increased emotional health and herefore spiritual progress can be built. At least, this seems to be my own experience.

Another exercise that I practice is to try for a full

inventory of my blessings and then for a right acceptance of the many gifts that are mine -- both temporal and spiritual. Here, I try to achieve a state of joyful gratitude. When such a brand of gratitude is repeatedly affirmed and pondered, it can finally displace the natural tendency to congratulate myself on whatever progress I may have been enabled to make in some areas of living. I try hard to hold fast to the truth that a full and thankful heart cannot entertain great conceits. When we are brimming with gratitude, our heartbeats must surely result in outgoing love, the finest emotion that we can ever know.

In times of very rough going, the grateful acceptance of my blessings, oft repeated, can also bring me some of the serenity of which our AA prayer speaks. Whenever I fall under acute pressures, I lengthen my daily walks and slowly repeat our Serenity Prayer in rhythm to my steps and breathing. If I feel that my pain has in part been occasioned by others, I try to repeat, "God grant me the serenity to love their best, and never fear their worst." This benign healing process of repetition, sometimes necessary to persist with for days, has seldom failed to restore me to at least a workable emotional balance and perspective.

Another helpful step is to steadfastly affirm the understanding that pain can bring. Indeed, pain is one of our greatest teachers. Though I still find it difficult to accept today's pain and anxiety with any great degree of serenity -- as those more advanced in the spiritual life seem able to do -- I can, if I try hard, give thanks for present pain nevertheless. I find the willingness to do this by contemplating the lessons learned from past suffering -- lessons which have led to the blessings I now enjoy. I can remember, if I insist, how the agonies of alcoholism, the pain of rebellion and thwarted pride, have often led me to God's grace, and so to a new freedom. So, as I walk along, I repeat still other phrases such as these: "Pain is the touchstone of progress." ... "Fear no evil." ... "This, too, will pass." ... "This experience can be turned to benefit."

These fragments of prayer bring far more than mere comfort. They keep me on the track of right acceptance; they break up my compulsive themes of guilt, depression, rebellion, and pride; and sometimes they endow me with the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference.

To those who have never given these potent exercises in acceptance a real workout, I recommend them highly the next time the heat is on. Or, for that matter, at any time! Grapevine, March 1962



Spiritual Awakening?

WHAT DO YOU MEAN when you talk about a 'spiritual awakening'?"...

Maybe there are as many definitions of spiritual awakening as there are people who have had them. But certainly each genuine one has something in common with all the others. And these things which they have in common are not too hard to understand. When a man or a woman has a spiritual awakening, the most important meaning of it is that he has now become able to do, feel, and believe that which he could not do before on his unaided strength and resources alone. He has been granted a gift which amounts to a new state of consciousness and being. He has been set on a path which tells him he is really going somewhere, that life is not a dead end, not something to be endured or mastered. In a very real sense he has been transformed, because he has laid hold of a source of strength which, in one way or another, he had hitherto denied himself. He finds himself in possession of a degree of honesty, tolerance, unselfishness, peace of mind, and love of which he had thought himself quite incapable. What he has received is a free gift, and yet usually, at least in some small part, he has made himself ready to receive it.

H & I'S GUIDELINES DEFINE INSTITUTIONS AS FACILITIES HOLDING IN CONFINEMENT MEN AND WOMEN FOR MEDICAL TREATMENT, MENTAL CARE AND THERAPY, OR CORRECTIVE AND REHABILITATIVE PURPOSES. THUS, INSTITUTIONS INCLUDE HOSPITALS. TREATMENT CENTERS, JAILS, PENITENTIARIES, ROAD CAMPS AND OTHER LIKE FACILITIES.

H & I VOLUNTEERS CURRENTLY CARRY THE THE A.A. MESSAGE AND A.A. CONFERENCE APPROVED LITERATURE INTO 45 CORRECTIONAL FACILITY MEETINGS AND 31 TREATMENT APPROVED THERATORE INTO 45 CORRECTIONAL PACIFITY MEETINGS AND 51 TREATMENT FACILITY MEETINGS EACH WEEK. AN H & I MEMBER VOLUNTEERS FOR ONE NIGHT A MONTH OR MORE. EACH FACILITY HAS AN H & I VOLUNTEER AS COORDINATOR. THE COORDINATOR ASKS FOR 2 OR 3 VOLUNTEERS TO BE PANEL MEMBERS. PANEL MEMBERS CARRY THE AA. MESSAGE INTO THE FACILITY MUCH LIKE A REGULAR OPEN-DISCUSSION AA.

SINCE I WAS ELECTED TO SERVE AS TREATMENT FACILITIES CHAIRPERSON FOR THE 1995 CALENDER YEAR, NINE TREATMENT FACILITIES HAVE ASKED FOR AN ALL MEETING TO BE HELD FOR THEIR CLIENTS. WE HAVE STARTED AND CONTINUED MEETINGS AT ONLY THREE OF THESE FACILITIES. TWO DID NOT MEET H & I GUIDELINES. FOUR ARE STILL WAITING FOR MEETINGS. I HAVE BECOME AWARE OF FOUR MONTH LAG—TIME BETWEEN THE TIME A MEETING IS REQUESTED AND THE ACTUAL TIME A MEETING IS STARTED.
WHILE WE HAVE HAD MANY NEW YOLUNTEERS THIS YEAR AND THEIR COMMITMENT AND GOD'S GRACE HAVE KEPT THINGS GOING, I HAVE COME TO BELIEVE THAT THIS FOUR MONTH LAG—TIME COULD AFFECT ALL AS A WHOLE. HE LODGS NOT REPRESENT A MONTH LAG-TIME COULD AFFECT A.A. AS A WHOLE. H. & I DOES NOT REPRESENT AS A WHOLE. HOWEVER, SINCE H. & I IS A PART OF A.A. ITS ACTIONS OR LACK OF ACTION MAY REFLECT UPON A.A. AS A WHOLE, MORE IMPORTANTLY, THIS LAG-TIME H & I DOES NOT REPRESENT AA MAY DEPRIVE AN INMATE OR CLIENT FROM THE HEARING THE A.A. MESSAGE.

THE REMEDY TO THIS SITUATION IS SIMPLE. MORE ALL MEMBERS INTERESTED IN THIS TYPE OF 12-STEP WORK ARE NEED TO VOLUNTEER FOR THE H & I COMMITTEE. CLOSE ENCOUNTERS OF A Snowy Kind

was a Christmas night. I had almost a year of sobriety, but I was still shaken up over a close call with a bottle of wine at the beginning of the holiday season. Now at 10 o'clock I could feel myself facing another close call. I found myself in circumstances that precluded any possibility of help, and that really frightened me. I was physically and mentally far from the security of my home meetings -- about as far from easy access to the comfort of AA as I could be.

We had just fought our way out from town in a blinding blizzard, after a typical anticlimactic Christmas day at my brother-in-law's, overeating and watching his boys with their new toys. My wife and I were staying at her parent's "little house on the prairie," aptly named by an older family member. This was a small ranch house surrounded by fields and woods and not much else. My wife and her parents were exhausted and preparing for bed. I began to feel I needed a cigarette, a cup of coffee -- in reality, a meeting. But this was a small town where I had no contacts. The nearest 7-11 was ten miles back to Watertown. (There were bets on in town whether they were going to top a hundred inches of snow by January 1. I looked out the window and saw snow blowing horizontally in the glare of the porch light. I knew how I'd place my money.) Inside, my father--law's wine and whiskey collection stared at me from every nook and cranny of the small house. I was getting desperate.

I told my wife I was running into town for cigarettes. She gave me an appropriate "you must be mad" look.

Somehow I got the car up the hill of the driveway, and knew if I could just get the few hundred yards to Route 81 I'd be home free. Just as I was heading down the ramp to the highway I noticed a large clunker of a car, apparently stranded. In the light of the car interior I saw two or three people, and walking up the ramp away from the car was an older man. I stopped my car and opened the window. The car had broken down. If I was heading into town, could I take his son's family back? He said he could easily walk home if he couldn't get his car started soon.

I was actually glad for the company, for the possibility of talking to another member of the human race this desolate night. They all piled in, three little kids included.

The son sat in the front seat. We were only two miles down the road when I found myself blurting out to my grateful passenger that I just had to "get out of the house," that I'd recently quit drinking and was afraid of taking a drink.

He looked at me and after a moment asked, "You a iend of Bill W.'s?" When I nodded, he said he was, too, was astonished and relieved.

When we got to Mike's apartment I was invited up, given a cigarette and a cup of coffee, and made to feel like a relative. I looked around Mike's tiny apartment and listened to a story of struggle in a not-too-presperous town.

But both Mike and his wife had solidly established programs, and when I went into the bathroom I saw a yellowed piece of paper with the Serenity Prayer taped to the bathroom mirror.

It was still Christmas night as I retraced my path through the snowy dark. Before I left, Mike had called his Dad -- the car had started immediately after we left. I thought of all this as I drove back, and remembered part of a prayer: "May he show us proof of our connection with him."
