My father died days after my birthday in 2012. He was 53 years old, just a few months shy of his 54th birthday. And it was honestly the shock in my life to date. It takes a lot to unnerve me, and his unexpected passing did just that. Never would have imagined that feeling in a million years. I would also have never guessed that he kept some important secrets from me and my sister. Like that he was a closet alcoholic.

That hurt. Not that
he attempted to drink his
sorrows away. The fact
that he felt the need to
keep it to himself. See,
my parents divorced
when I was nine and my
sister was in diapers. Being

adults, they had their reasons, and all I knew was that things were changing. And somewhere in between nine and twenty-six,

When I arrived at my first meeting, I was desperately looking for what I thought was a solution to an impossible situation. I was defeated and absolutely demoralized. Within minutes



I am pleased to announce that, effective tonight, you will have to see and listen to me at least once a month, for the next two years. My name is Adrian Ontiveros and I am the incoming Area 08 Alternate Delegate and also it's liaison to the Coordinating Council. Thank you to Richard O. for his service in this position. The Area passed it's 2024 Spending Plan at the November 11th Budget Assembly. There were other orders of business surrounding support of the Area's 12th Step work through its Servants & Committees. Our next Assembly is taking place on Saturday, January 13th in Rancho Bernardo. It is our Orientation Assembly & we will hopefully be welcoming many new & some returning GSRs and DCMs. We will be starting the 74th General Service Panel with a slate of new officers and other members of the Area Committee. There will be a training workshop for these new members in February. The General Service Conference agenda items will be front and center soon after that. We will be preparing our incoming Delegate for his trip to the GSC in New York. He will be armed with the informed conscience of our Area on the current topics and affairs surrounding A.A. as a whole.

November 2023 Financial Summary:

Net Revenue is -\$870. Our 2023 YTD Net Revenue is \$2,931. Group & Individual Contributions were \$11,948. Literature Sales Revenue & Bank Interest was \$1,683; while total office & committee expenses were -\$14,641.

- Meeting statistics: currently there are 1,025 meeting per week in Central San Diego. 929 of these are in person and 242 are online or hybrid (26%). This compares to July of 2022 when there were 1,055 meetings, with 776 are in person and 353 are online or hybrid (45%).
- The Big Book Initiative is off to a great start. Everyone who has been shopping in the bookstore so far this month has been really excited about the sale.
- . We are continuing to get many positive reactions to the new arrangement of the bookstore.
- Central Office is in need of a Daytime Phone Volunteer every other Friday afternoon from 1-5 pm and to fill-in for our regular Volunteers when they are unable to fill their regular shift for whatever reason. Please call Central Office with your availability.
- Central Office is looking for volunteers to cover the phones for all shifts on Christmas Day and New Year's Day. This can be done remotely.
- Central Office will be closed on Monday, December 25 for Christmas Day & Monday January 1 for New Year's Day.
- Judi will be out of the office on December 21-22 & Lisa Ann will be out of the office Dec. 28-30.



A.A. did not ORIGINATE it. VERSIONS of it seem to have been used for CENTURIES in various FAITHS, and it is now widely current outside A.A., as well as within the Fellowship. Whether we belong to this church or that, whether we are humanists, agnostics, or atheists, most of us have found these words a WONDERFUL guide in getting SOBER, staying sober, and

enjoying our sobriety. Whether we see the Serenity PRAYER as an actual prayer or just as a FERVENT wish, it offers a SIMPLE prescription for a healthy EMOTIONAL life. We've put one thing right at the head of the list among 'the things we CANNOT change': our alcoholism. No MATTER what we do, we know that TOMORROW we won't suddenly be nonalcoholic—any more than we'll be ten years YOUNGER or six inches TALLER. We couldn't change our alcoholism. But we didn't say MEEKLY, 'All right, I'm an alcoholic. Guess I'll just have to drink MYSELF to DEATH.' There was something we could change. We didn't have to be DRUNK alcoholics. We could become sober alcoholics. Yes, that did take COURAGE. And we needed a FLASH of wisdom to see that it was POSSIBLE, that we could change ourselves." 
A.A. Economics



Book of the Month: Living Sober

"Making use of 'telephone therapy': When we were first trying to achieve sobriety, many of us found ourselves taking a drink without planning to. Sometimes, it seemed to happen practically without our knowing it. There was no conscious decision to drink, and there was no real thought about possible consequences. We had not intended to set off an entire drinking episode. Now we have learned that simply postponing that first drink, putting something else in its place, provides us with a chance to think about our drinking history, to think about the disease of alcoholism, and to think about the probable results of starting to drink. Fortunately, we can do more than just think about it, and we do. We telephone someone.

When we stopped drinking, we were told repeatedly to get A.A. people's telephone numbers, and instead of drinking, to phone these people. At first, the thought of telephoning a new acquaintance, someone we barely knew, seemed strange, and most of us were reluctant. But the A.A.'s—those with more nondrinking days behind them than we had—kept suggesting it. They said they understood why we hesitated, because they had felt the same way. Nevertheless, they said, just try it, at least once. And so, finally, thousands and thousands of us have. To our relief, it turned out to be an easy, pleasant experience. Best of all, it worked. Maybe the quickest way to understand this, before you try it, is to put yourself mentally in the place of the person being called. It is a rewarding and gratifying thing to be trusted that much. So the person receiving the call is almost invariably nice, even charming, about it—not at all surprised, and even glad to hear from us." Page 23, Reprinted with permission from A.A.W.S.

our father/daughter relationship went for a roller coaster ride. Whether it was visiting for every other weekend, disappearing for several years without a phone call or letter, surprising his way back into our lives and so forth, the list could go on. But the most important point of this back story is to clarify that after all the ups and downs, we were actually slowly working on rebuilding our relationship. It would never be what it could have been based on in the past, but it was going to be far more than nothing.

In fact, things were going so well in our efforts that we were independently making plans to spend time with him. In January 2012, my conversation with him literally had been, "Hey Dad, I need a vacation, and sis has a break coming up. Guess what? Your princesses are flying over to spend time with you in sunny paradise in March! Get the red carpet ready!" And he joked right back, "Thank God I am bald already, or I would lose all my hair due to financial stress." And I know he was really excited that we wanted to come see him, and about our actual visit! We were talking more frequently and about things like trying to figure out how to bring his favorite pizza frozen on the plane from Chicago or what we were going to do while together. We had just

finished making flight arrangements for my sister over the phone. I was trying to wrap up a big project at work that week so I told him I would call over the weekend since the trip was only 2 weeks away. But not even three days passed when I got the phone call that he had had a heart attack in his sleep and had died overnight. I didn't believe it. I dialed his cell phone and just got his voicemail. How was this happening? It felt like we had JUST gotten off the phone about flight arrangements. I mean, how could he die? We were coming to see him!

But it was happening. Flying to California, making arrangements, entering his new apartment for the first time, finding vodka bottles throughout, numbly dealing and trying to make sense of it all while trying to accept that this was the reality. As we were packing, I found paperwork, receipts, and AA newsletters.

My father was an alcoholic. And he was seeking treatment. All those random trips he took that we thought were for training for his vocation? AA rehab. And I never bothered to think otherwise because the stories he told made complete sense. Why would I doubt him at this point in our lives?

We are not the type of kids to judge harshly, or who would have velled at him over the fibs and the alcoholism. And it would not have changed my perception of my father to be completely frank. It would have simply brought to light that my dad was really not happy with whatever it was that had or was happening in his life. It takes an individual a LOT of courage to admit that s/he needs help. We would have been a mini cheering squad just for him- even if he was having a hard time coping.

I will never know what his reasons were for not sharing, but I forgive him. And I am so proud that despite all of his mistakes, that he was able to find the resolve to admit it to himself and seek support. I only wish he had given himself the chance to experience our encouragement, and to participate in our lives unfolding before us through graduations, weddings, babies, and all the dreams and chapters that make life so beautiful.

of being exposed to the sober members of that group I was convinced that I had found the solution to my hopeless condition and the desire to drink was removed from me on the spot and has never returned. That was on Oct. 15, 1969. I wish every new member could have that type of experience, but we know that many of us are not that receptive in the beginning. Most of the members of that early group were over forty years old and I was only 28 yrs. old but I was the exception at that time.

Meetings were much smaller since there were no rehab facilities intervening in the alcoholic's drinking escapades, so they did not start hitting their bottom till their forties or fifties and it had something to do with midlife crisis or was that just a coincidence. What I do see that is different from my experience is the blurred line when comes to the first requirement for AA membership: "a desire to stop drinking." or employer told me that I had to stop drinking, considering the relief I got from the bottle, I doubt that I would have been as receptive to getting sober, and if I had, I am sure I would have relapses as much as any of those who, unfortunately, struggle with staying sober. It appears that many of the AA members of today have seen a high percentage of relapses

and they attribute that as an abysmal success ratio in AA, but they assume that just because they were sent to AA, from a rehab facility that they should be lumped in with those, like me, who had a desire to stop drinking and came in looking for answers. These relapses are the natural result when the desire to drink is stronger than the desire to stay sober.


In the Foreword to the second edition of the Big Book it says: Of alcoholics who came to AA, and really tried, 50% got sober at once and remained that way: 25% sobered up after some relapses. I often ask a newcomer what caused them to give AA a visit and most of them say that the main reasons were DUI's, Work related requirements, and spouse's ultimatums. Occasionally someone says, "I just ran out of ideas, and I need help". The latter is usually the one in ten that stays sober without relapse. I also believe that if you counted only the ones that came in searching for answers, the same ratio as in the foreword to the Big Book would still apply. Seventy five percent is not bad. The good news is that many of the members that are here as the result of intervention or other motivations

often become


what they refer to as the "educational variety" often get sober years before they would have had they not been intervened upon. We treat these brothers and sisters with empathy, compassion and understanding. The awareness in the community has taken away much of the stigma (not all) of being cursed with the disease of alcoholism and where we had meetings totaling ten or twelve members, we now have twenty to forty members attending. Sometimes the fruit gets picked before it is ripe, but it is never discarded.


