Choice in Drink?

Further refection on Step One brought about a different understanding of its context. The first the two parts of this step are separated by a dash – not a hyphen. A dash fulfills both segments of a sentence, e.g.: "We admitted we were powerless over alcohol – that our lives had become unmanageable."

At first, I considered the second part "unmanageable" to mean; drunk tanks, getting fired again, losing friends, etc. — and it sort of does. However, much more prevalent is the "powerlessness"

When I first got to Alcoholics Anonymous, I found the first 164 pages of the Big Book to be difficult to read, at least to read with understanding.

My mind was still foggy from years of excessive drinking in addition to the fact that the concepts therein were completely foreign to me.

Alcoholism is an incurable disease contracted by, you might say, 10% of the population. It is an incurable disease, but it can be arrested.

It is no respecter of age, gender, intelligence, religion, or economic status. Why, you might say, 90% of the population can drink with impunity is hard to understand but we who have been in the AA program for a while know that you can adopt a way of life that removes the obsession to drink without the white knuckling

side effects, and you will be comfortable in your own skin without the use of medicine.

The symptoms of alcoholism are a combination of mental, physical, emotional, and spiritual in nature. The alcoholic awakes every morning to face, "The hideous four horsemen, Terror, Bewilderment, Frustration, Despair." (pg. 151 BB.)

Doctors, Counselors, Priests, and Ministers, when afflicted, come to AA to get relief from this horrible disease. When our desperation out-weighs our denial we show up at the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous and discover a road map to a life of peace and happiness that we believed did not exist.

Alcoholism is a progressive disease and Alcoholics Anonymous is a progressive solution and not a quick fix. These desperate alcoholics finds a degree of hope and comfort when first exposed to the AA group and the laughter and lighthearted banter going on between the members before the meeting even starts.

They hear members sharing about Guilt, Shame, Fear and Insecurity and they identified with these symptoms. They hear laughter when a person describes a horrible incident in their life and they think they are laughing at the horror but, in fact, they discover that the laughter was focused on the absurdity of our alcoholic thinking, at the time, and they all identify with it. If they are fortunate, the long, slow process has just begun, and each day becomes better than the last.

They begin to understand why they did the things they did while under the influence of alcoholism and in the grip of alcoholic thinking.

They begin to understand how their irrational fears influenced their decision-making and discover that the solution to that problem is too Live by unselfish and proven principles.

They begin to understand that guilt, shame, fear, and insecurity were the core issues that could quickly be put to rest by alcohol and halfway through their second drink everything seemed right



with the world.

The world had not changed but their perception of it had. To compensate for the fears and insecurities they had to protect their turf, so they learned how to rationalize those established behavioral patterns they were not proud of.

Family responsibilities took a backseat to the boozing and their family let them know about it so, back to the bar they went. The guilt and shame weighed heavy on their mind and to drink would take care of that temporarily. In the program they come to learn how to admit their mistakes and make restitution for all those faulty behaviors and get on the positive side of the ledger. " – Selfishness – Self-Centeredness! That we think is the root of our troubles. Driven by a hundred

forms of fear, self-delusion selfseeking and self-pity we step on the toes of our fellows and they retaliate". (BB pg.62)

Can you blame them? There are 12 steps in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous and each step is preparatory to the next. If we give due diligence to every one of those 12 Steps, we evolved into the person we always wished we could become.

We can't stop drinking if we can't stop the alcoholic thinking. Again, In the program, each day seems better than the day before. One day at a time. One issue at a time. One solution at a time. I can't explain My AA experience any better than that. ~ Rick R.

Continued from page 1 in the first part which had caused my life to become "unmanageable." My real powerlessness was when I started drinking, I could not stop, but when I stopped drinking, I could not stop starting. (Physical Allergy and Mental Obsession).

While years of "quitting drinking" failure by use of willpower, I never knew about the allergy-obsession syndrome: I never realized that I was powerless; that I had: "no choice in the matter of drink." (p. 24 of the BB)

As alcoholic despair deepened throughout the last Twenty-four years of drinking. My efforts were not superficial: No more Lucky Strike cigarettes! High protein milkshakes! Running! Handball! Swimming! Weightlifting! Why I felt wonderful! Who needs booze?

I was like the guy on page 57 of the Big Book (Fitz M): "He couldn't drink if he would." But alas, I came to believe that I had to drink whether I chose to or not — it would seem as though "quitting drinking" just got me drunk — and often in short order.

Could I have the same dramatic relief as Fitz? Well, like Fitz, I asked God for help and have not had to drink alcoholic since my very first AA meeting.

Choosing to drink alcohol has been removed from my emotional vocabulary, e.g.: Choosing "to drink" or "not to drink" no longer occurs to me. I certainly hope that "choice in drink" never returns.

of the book became both more understandable and more relatable.

I found myself in two distinct places. The first was the Doctor's Opinion, specifically when he describes the craving allergy: "...the phenomenon of craving is limited to this class (chronic alcoholics) and never occurs in the average temperate drinker." (Big Book p. xxvi).

Later in this chapter, the doctor again makes the same assertion: "This phenomenon (craving) ... may be a manifestation of an allergy which differentiates these people, and sets them apart as a distinct entity." (Big Book p. xxviii).

The second place that I found myself was in Chapter Three, "More About Alcoholism", and that is where the title of this piece comes from. "No person likes to think he is bodily and mentally different from his fellows." (Big Book p.30).

I would prefer to think that I was just a normal person, albeit a rather heavy drinker, who had run into a stream of bad luck and unfortunate circumstances.

If I were somehow able to modify my drinking, or even abstain for a period of time, then everything would be fine. I would be just a normal guy with some embarrassing stories to tell and a few minor entries on my rap sheet. But the Book tells me different. The man who wrote the Doctor's Opinion, William Silkworth, MD, did so based solely on observations he had made over the course of many years trying to treat patients with alcoholism. His observations and his opinions have stood the test of time.

During the intervening eight decades since his words were first published, medical science has confirmed the existence of that phenomenon of craving and has shown that it can be correlated to observed changes that occur in the alcoholic brain.

Dynamic scans of the brain of an alcoholic who has taken a drink show activity that does not take place in the brain of a nonalcoholic who takes that same drink.

I have accepted the fact that I am bodily and mentally different from all of those normies out there. Could it be that I am actually of a different species?


Most likely that would be a subspecies as, alas, the good Lord has allowed us to reproduce with other homo sapiens, ensuring that our kind will not become endangered.





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

encounter in a lifetime. We are conditioned to think and react in a certain way as the result of the experiences we are exposed to.

Newcomers in Alcoholics Anonymous, and even some seasoned veterans, often find it hard to grasp a concept of "a power greater than ourselves."

This is probably the biggest hurdle we in AA must face in our search for a happy and meaningful life.

Once we get past all our resistance to the concept of a Higher Power, it becomes much easier to proceed with the rest of the program. What is meant by the word God and what God can do for us, can mean something different to just about everyone that is having difficulty with it, and if God alone was the answer, why do priests and ministers come to AA for treatment; why not just go to church?

Alcoholics Anonymous is here for all alcoholics that want to get sober regardless of their approach to faith. Anyone that thinks that we are trying to convert someone into a religion or out of a religion is simply misguided.

The Big Book and the 12X12 have many comments explaining this, but unfortunately this old conditioning, bolstered by the EGO, seems to block some of us from breaking down the resistance on this subject. Or some members may just fake it to appear to be going along with the program, but never getting the results. If we denied the possibility of a God of the different religious groups, they could not have AA available to them, and if we made it a requirement that we picked one of those beliefs, atheists would be left out and where would Buddhists stand?

If a person believes that he does not have a higher power, I might remind him/her that alcohol was more powerful or else why would he or she need AA.

With this in mind, I might suggest that he or she may only need to find a power greater than alcohol to begin with. Then, as it says in Step 2 in the 12X12, "To acquire it, I had only to stop fighting and practice the rest of A.A.'s program as enthusiastically as I could."

As I look back on it now, I realize that that was exactly the way I found my way through this challenge. I find absolutely no conflict in any approach that one discovers on his own, only that he practices the rest of the program with enthusiasm.

What it seems to imply is that if you trust the process and just do the suggestions, you will find a suitable understanding of a power greater than yourself that you can do business with.

I'm still not sure what or who (if you like) I am asking for guidance from but I'm open minded about these things, and I have to let everyone find their own brand of enlightenment, without prejudging anyone else's approach on this matter.

I believe that changing my perception was what put me firmly on the road to recovery. The only thing that I have to resist is my EGO, and the way I do that is by living by sound and unselfish principles many of which are discussed in AA meetings, and many are assimilated through osmosis as I continue to put two and two together.

It is not that complicated. If I don't get caught up in the debate and just follow the simplest suggestions, it all works out fine.

God had restored his sanity." (p. 57). *

Indeed, page 86 of our basic text promises "The problem has been removed. It does not exist for us." However, this is only so long as I remain in a fit spiritual condition and God has restored me to sanity, then I cannot choose to drink.

Today, I have no choice in the matter of drink, nor do I want one!

protect ourselves from perceived dangers, and how we control these instincts usually is the measure of how well balanced we turn out emotionally.

So much of the A.A. program involves the



understanding of these instinctive drives and our willingness and our ability to come to terms with these natural impulses when they far exceed their natural purpose.


Each year during the winter my wife puts out a puzzle and as the

days go by, we find time to sit around the table and chat and spend time together.

As we dump the puzzle out of the box, we first turn all the pieces right side up and spread them out. As we do this, we find some pieces with straight edges that form the perimeter, and they are easy to figure out.

The easiest pieces to figure out are the four corners and that is where we start. These pieces form the framework of the puzzle. Next, we find pieces that have numbers on them or other common characteristics such as colors or patterns that make it easy to fit them together. Others have different shades that can be compared to each other and reveal the general location of where it will fit in and soon everything starts to develop.

When we get to the blue-sky part of the picture, things slowdown a



bit and these pieces are less obvious, but the puzzle isn't finished until all of the pieces are in place and that may be the day we shuffle off this mortal coil.

To me, all of this is like the way the pieces of Alcoholics Anonymous are pictured in my mind.

The desires to stop drinking and to come to meetings are like the cornerstones that start the whole process moving. Next, getting a sponsor, beginning to take the steps, getting into service, and helping others and so on, are some of the framework pieces that are obvious to most of us.

Next, we start to recognize some of the more obvious defects of character that need to be addressed and they are numerous if we are strong enough to admit it. If we are not, the picture will never be complete.

As we continue to clear up these issues (wreckage of the past) and put them behind us, it would be easy to rest on our laurels and be satisfied with half measures.

If, however, we are diligent about

continuing this process of examining our motives for everything we do, until it becomes second nature, our life will become a rewarding adventure and all of those negative emotions are replaced daily with feelings of wellbeing.

This is the blue-skies portion of the puzzle, as I see it. The part that many of us often miss simply because of indifference, and we may miss

out on the freedom and peace of mind we seek.

If you are one of those that finds themselves in that malaise, let me encourage you to consider revisiting those items that you skipped over and let your conscience rather than your EGO win this battle. It may be the best decision you have made since you made the decision

to come to AA.

Those misguided instincts that fueled those faulty behaviors have had their way far too long. Let's get those pieces of the puzzle into place and see where it takes us. I guarantee that you won't regret it. 7075-B Mission Gorge Road San Diego, CA 92120-2454






"Finally, he found a basement bar on a quiet side street, practically deserted. He sat down on a bar stool and ordered a double bourbon on the rocks. The bartender said, 'Yes, sir,' and reached for a bottle.

Then the bartender stopped in his tracks, took a long hard look at the customer, leaned over the bar, and said in a low tone, 'I was in Milwaukee about four months ago, and one night I attended an open meeting. SERENITY PRAYER

God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change

The courage to change the things I can

And Wisdom to know the difference

"This prayer has been credited to almost every theologian, philosopher and saint known to man. It was actually written around 1932 by Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr of the Union Theological Seminary in New York City, as the ending to a longer prayer. In 1934, the doctor's friend and neighbor, Dr. Howard Robbins, asked permission to use this part of the longer prayer in a compilation he was making at the time. It was published in that year in Dr. Robbin's book of prayers.

The prayer came to the attention of an early member of A.A. in 1940. He read it in an obituary in the New York Herald Tribune. He liked it so much he brought it to G.S.O., then on Vesey Street, for Bill W. to read. When Bill and the staff read the little prayer they felt that it particularly suited the needs of A.A. Cards were printed and passed around. Thus has this simple little prayer become a part of the A.A. literature." (From the July, 1961 A.A. Exchange Bulletin)



the astounding promises on page 63 begin to happen right away (*before the prayer*). My sponsor allowed near-zero time between the decision and the prayer. *Immediately* following Step Two we prayed the Third step prayer together.

Those promises began to manifest shortly thereafter and have continued to this day! I especially appreciate the promise of being reborn. This means to me that I can now see and act on the truth in drink. I have not had to drink alcohol since! I like the saying: "I can't. God can! I'll ask Him to help me." And I would like to add: NOW.

The Third Step decision, followed by a prayer-of-askance, does not provide a comprehensive assurance of continuing sobriety. A decision minus action is only an intention. Half measures availed us nothing. Someone said: "God will help you with the steps, but He won't do them for you." We are told: "This was only a beginning." Then we are told to launch out on a course of vigorous action. This, of course, would be to follow the clear-cut Twelve Step directions from our basic text.

My sponsor was adamant concerning the Big Book timetable, not only with for first three, but as prescribed throughout all the steps. I was so lucky to be afforded a Big Book sponsor. Thank you, God!

those years starting off as lampshade drunkenness. Then the tolerance started to develop to the point that I was pretty good at drinking. That only lasted for a short time, and then I entered into the black-out phase and that wasn't a pretty sight. My first wife left me, and for the next two years I went through the self-pity phase when I hung out in bars and got into fights, got locked up, and cried in my beer a lot.

I spent much of those last few years thinking that one day I would evolve into a responsible adult and put all if it behind me, but that never happened. Then one day I woke up from a black-out drunk and somehow realized that if I didn't do something about my drinking, I was going to die a young and horrible death. I threw in the towel, called AA, and started this wonderful journey.

As I look back on it now, I can understand why alcohol had the effect on me that it didn't have on nine out of ten of the others that I drank with in those early days. We were all partying, and the alcohol masked the differences between them and me. They enjoyed it all right, but they went home and went to work the next morning. I went right back to the bar again and in search of that euphoria I experienced that first time I drank and every time thereafter.

After years of sobriety, it occurred to me that the drink quelled all of those fears and inhibitions that we alcoholics face each morning upon awakening that the normal drinker never has to face. That is what makes us different. Once our tolerance for alcohol is depleted, it never returns. That is the hardest fact for the alcoholic to face.

In chapter 3 of the Big Book it states, "The delusion that we are like other people, or presently may be, has to be *smashed*. We know that no real alcoholic ever recovers control." In my early days of sobriety at the meetings in Los Angeles, most of the meetings that I attended read a portion of chapter three as well as the portion of chapter five that we do here. That portion of the book drives home the true nature of this disease, but they stopped reading at the words: "ad infinitum."

I suggest that a person read one more paragraph after that that always brought home to me the fact that I was responsible for my own recovery. If I had a desire to stop drinking, AA could help me accomplish that, but by no means will it work for me until I except that devastating fact.

The abnormal fears and inhibitions that I faced in the beginning of my AA journey are no longer a problem now that I have embraced the program in the spirit that is suggested.

All I would need to do to have them return would be to rest on my laurels and ignore the wisdom of those who came before me and that is not going to happen here. I may be sick but I'm not foolish.

We get a daily reprieve based upon the maintenance of our spiritual condition and as long as I have days left, I am not finished.

ourselves" could restore me to sanity, I wonder if A.A. would have succeeded in the way that it has, especially when we consider the problems that the Oxford group had with this issue.

I have seen people talking of religion, and others that were irritated with any talk of God, yet we still hold hands at the end of the meeting and say a prayer and everyone leaves the meeting feeling a little better.

I personally know priests and ministers in the program, and they seem to adjust to the diversity of the landscape. I wish that it could be simpler for each person, but there are no two people that are identical in this matter.

Speaking for myself,

if I wanted to be freed from the deadly obsession of alcoholism, I had to trust the guidance of the two books that are suggested, and the leadership of the more experienced members of the group, to come to terms with a concept of a power greater than myself. I was the one in the 12&12 that "tried religion and had found it wanting." I also read that, "even the militant atheist got through the hoop with room to spare." I did not believe in the God of the religionist in the same way that I thought, they did, but I did not think I was an atheist either.

The Power Greater than myself

came to me as a *profound Change of Perception* brought about by the Love, Understanding and Compassion I sensed as they welcomed me.

These experiences were a great way for me to start, but NOW, WHAT ABOUT PRAYER? Who or what do I pray to?

I heard about doorknobs and icons, the ocean, and other such things but that way of thinking did not set well with me. I did not want to be too glib about such an important matter. Then I noticed that, in step two, it did not say that I had to believe <u>in</u>

anything, only that I had to believe <u>that</u> a power greater than myself, could restore me to sanity.

The collective wisdom of the AA program and the people in it have been the framework for my faith in a higher power. The experience that I had in that front yard, fifty-one years ago, was all I needed to know to get on with the rest of the program.

I pray to God every day to show me what to do and to give me the strength to do it and I still do not know for sure, who or what God is. I use the word God, only to describe the spiritual influence that A.A. has had on this drunk.

I pray to God as I understand God, and he expresses himself in my consciousness, the only thing left for me to do is to separate the wheat from the chaff.

AA OLD PREAMBLE 1940

We are gathered here because we are faced with the fact that we are powerless over alcohol and unable to do anything about it without the help of a Power greater than ourselves. We feel that each person's religious views, if any, are his own affair. The simple purpose of the program of Alcoholics Anonymous is to show what may be done to enlist the aid of a Power greater than ourselves regardless of what our individual conception of that Power may be. In order to form a habit of depending upon and referring all we do to that Power, we must at first apply ourselves with some diligence. By often repeating these acts, they become habitual and the help rendered becomes natural to us. We have all come to know that as alcoholics we are suffering from a serious illness for which medicine has no cure. Our condition may be the result of an allergy which makes us different from other people. It has never been by any treatment with which we are familiar, permanently cured. The only relief we have to offer is absolute abstinence, the second meaning of A.A.

There are no dues or fees. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. Each member squares his debt by helping others to recover.

An Alcoholics Anonymous is an alcoholic who through application and adherence to the A.A. program has forsworn the use of any and all alcoholic beverage in any form. The moment he takes so much as one drop of beer, wine, spirits or any other alcoholic beverage he automatically loses all status as a member of Alcoholics Anonymous. A.A. is not interested in sobering up drunks who are not sincere in their desire to remain sober for all time. Not being reformers, we offer our experience only to those who want it. We have a way out on which we can absolutely agree and on which we can join in harmonious action. Rarely have we seen a person fail who has thoroughly followed our program. Those who do not recover are people who will not or simply cannot give themselves to this simple program. Now you may like this program or you may not, but the fact remains, it works. It is our only chance to recover. There is a vast amount of fun in the A.A. fellowship. Some people might be shocked at our seeming worldliness and levity but just underneath there lies a deadly earnestness and a full realization that we must put first things first and with each of us the first thing is our alcoholic problem.

To drink is to die. Faith must work twenty-four hours a day in and through us or we perish. In order to set our tone for this meeting I ask that we bow our heads in a few moments of silent prayer and meditation. I wish to remind you that whatever is said at this meeting expresses our own individual opinion as of today and as of up to this moment. We do not speak for A.A. as a whole and you are free to agree or disagree as you see fit, in fact, it is suggested that you pay no attention to anything which might not be reconciled with what is in the A.A. Big Book.

If you don't have a Big Book, it's time you bought you one. Read it, study it, live with it, loan it, scatter it, and then learn from it what it means to be an A.A.

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

an hour or so – there was no reason for my previous apprehension.

When finished, I was amazed by the many unsuspected "rewards" I had received! I had learned how to face and be rid of resentment and irrational fear. What Great Rewards!

I also learned (admitted) where I had harmed others through my selfishness and how my dishonesty was more prevalent than realized. Also, I had a list of persons I had harmed for upcoming Steps Eight and Nine.

I had asked God to relieve me of the "bondage of self" in Step Three but had little knowledge of what that bondage was, but Step Four provided the answer!

Not only had I truthful information to share with my sponsor in Step Five, but I then possessed a list of character defects and shortcomings to ask God remove in Steps Six and Seven!

These rewards were not only helpful in my daily living but also paved the path to the many powerful AA promises. The main of which is on page 85: "The problem has been removed. It does not exist for us." The "problem" was, of course, the mental obsession, not the physical allergy. This release from desire to drink alcohol has been with me for many years, thanks to the rewards of Step Four.

Sometimes the word friend is misunderstood. We often refer to people we are associated with as friends. Others will say that you can count on one hand the true friends you will have in a lifetime. So where do these associate/acquaintances come in?

I played golf for about 35 years and had many so-called golfer friends but when the round of golf was over, we put our clubs in the car and went our separate ways. Fishing was the same. When we finished fishing, we put the rods and tackle box in the car and went home.

With these acquaintances, the common denominator was the golf or the fishing. That is what bound us to each other. I quit playing golf about 15 years ago and when the common denominator was gone, I seldom saw my old golfing friends except in passing where we exchanged pleasantries and again were on our ways.

Most of the, so called, friends I had before I was sober had only one thing in common with me and that was the drinking. Unlike the golf and the fishing, we could drink 24 hours a day if we wanted to. We did not need a boat or even a set of clubs to associate with each other. The bottle was all that was necessary and without it we had little in common.

When the common denominator was gone, trying to hang out with them became awkward for them and for me. I had to accept the reality and let them be. If we have anything else in common, we will know it and share that association with each other, but that was seldom the case except for family members or work associates.

We, in AA, are fortunate indeed for we have a common denominator that has been likened to the survivors on a sinking ship, in a lifeboat, caring for each other. We associate at such a deep an intimate level that we develop true friendships that the average person seldom is exposed to.

Understanding this can be a great comfort to those new members who may need to be prepared to move on with their lives. If that new member is fortunate enough adopt the AA program for the long haul, he may become the true friend that those old acquaintances in the bar room may need should they become a troubled alcoholic seeking help themselves.

I cannot tell you how many true friends I have developed in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, but I have been grappling them unto my soul for over 50 years now. Thank you, Mr. Shakespeare.

next one on my list, until I found someone that could not say no.

After I entered Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) and got deeper into the program I had to address my behavioral problems of the past and make restitution to those people, I realized how difficult it was for a loved one to say NO to a child or a friend when they appeal to them the way we do.

Then, came the acid test for me. I received a collect phone call from a divorced relative, (mother of two daughters ages 11 and 13) asking me for, what was, a goodly amount of money at that time. I was aware of her use of drugs and her priorities about her children.

At first, she did not want to say why she needed the money, but after I insisted, she said that she was in jail and need to get bailed out.

Visions of my past came back, and I was now on the receiving end of the enabling process. Writing the check would have been the easy thing to do, but as I now understand, not the right thing.

I asked her why she called me instead of her friends. She replied," yours was the only number I could find". I thought about it for moment then said, "*if I thought it would help*, I would be all over it but, I know your track record and I know that if I bail you out, you will be running again, and your girls need you right now." and when I get a chance to talk to them on a personal level the first question, I ask them is: "If that had not happened would you be here right now?" and their usual response is, "Probably not."

The right decision is not always the most popular one and I may be misunderstood when I make it, but in good conscience I do try to muster up the strength to make it.

Writing the check would have been the easy way and I may have been applauded for doing it but, for me, it would have been the more selfish thing to do. That single act may have been the turning point in her life, but no one can predict the outcome of any decision we make.

As I look back on it now. If no one ever said NO to me, I may never have changed and could have reached the point of no return and ended badly.


Sometimes I must risk the disapproval of those that do not understand me. I, however, must make sure that my motives are unselfish.





"(In 1948, Dr. Bob recalled the absolutes as "the only yardsticks" Alcoholics Anonymous had in the early days, before the Twelve Steps. He said he still felt they held good and could be extremely helpful when he wanted to do the right thing and the answer was not obvious. "Almost always, if I measure my decision carefully by the yardsticks of absolute honesty, absolute unselfishness, absolute purity, and absolute love, and it checks up pretty well with those four; then my answer can't be very far out of the way," he said. The absolutes are still published and widely quoted at A.A. meetings in the Akron-Cleveland area.)"







we begin Step Five at "first opportunity" (p. 74) which tuned out to be approximately ten minutes after completing Step Four.

My sponsor, Carl, helped me realize, from my Step Four list, where I had been selfish; dishonest; resentful; and fearful to an extent that I had never realized.

As a matter of fact, he pointed out

that most all my character defects, etc., would fall under one or more of these four "grosser handicaps" (p. 71).

They were like an **umbrella**! If I improve on these four major items, then the minor ones would become less destructive, or hopefully disappear.

Step Five not only simplified the step process but brought about a **confirmed awareness** of my defects for God to remove in Step Seven. I also learned the necessity of facing up to selfishness, dishonesty, resentment, and fear if I were to live in the spirit of Step Ten.

It was pointed out that these four defects are mentioned in Step Ten (p. 84) and Step Eleven (p. 86).

These four demons were indeed enemies of my sobriety.

This new **awareness** has brought me to realize why going on the wagon or *quitting drinking forever*, year after year, never lasted. My personality problems (bondage of

self) remained active throughout those periods of abstinence.

Although Step Five has not completely removed these dangerous barriers, I have been able to maintain a "*personality change sufficient to bring about recovery from alcoholism*" (p. 567) for many years. Thank God for progress, not perfection.

drink" has not occurred to me for many years — it seems to have been removed from my emotional vocabulary!

But for a better detailed description, here are a few

promises from pages 84 & 85 of the Big Book:

- We will seldom be interested in liquor.
- If tempted, we recoil from it as from a hot flame.
- We will see that our new attitude toward liquor has been given us without any thought or effort on our part.
- We are not fighting it, neither are we avoiding temptation.
- We have not even sworn off. Instead, the problem has been removed (This means the mental obsession—not the physical allergy). It does not exist for us.

Not so fast, there is a prerequisite! "That is how we react so long as we keep in fit spiritual condition."

How? By living in the spirit of Steps 10, 11 & 12.

Non-Big Book readers might state: "If I were recovered, I'd start drinking again."

This is logical thinking using the normal definition of the word "recovered." However, those who have studied the Big Book can easily see the folly in that sort of thinking because they understand the allergy/obsession syndrome.

The Big Book uses the recovered word in a special and technical sense that readers can easily understand.

I often use the phrase "release from the mental obsession" at meetings to avoid controversary.

alcoholics than anything else." With that in mind, you would think that it would be the first thing on the agenda, but it was not.

As I look back on it now, I had too many other things on my mind to deal with and as a result of the complacency I wasn't motivated to tackle the resentment issue as a serious matter and apparently many of my A. A. buddies somewhat dismissed it as well.

We spent much of our time pointing out the faults of other members in the form of gossip, especially when they were not present.

When I did start to address the issue, I did not consider the gossip and pointing out their faults to be enough of a problem. Dealing with past relationships was present on my mind and eventually I could not dismiss it and still sleep nights.

I came to understand that all of

those people of the past meant something to me, or I wouldn't be so

upset about them and If I wanted

to enjoy the Peace of Mind that is promised in the program, I would have to make things right with them. It occurred to me that no one's perfect and I had to find a way to neutralize my resentments.

If you have ever thrown a rock out into a pond and seen the water rings expanding outward, you would know how I feel about just about everyone that I have dealt with in the past, including myself. My rings of resentment are colliding with their rings and their rings are colliding with everyone else's rings at the same time.

In the past I was always threatened by their rings and I could simply drink them away but, in the program Alcoholics Anonymous I have come to understand that I am fortunate to have found the solution to my problem, and unfortunately many of them may never find the resolutions.

As а result, with this understanding, I am no longer threatened by what they think of me and I no longer judge them on their behavior since I was in the same boat as they were at one time. I am not the person I was before I discovered the A.A. program and whether they know it or not I can be compassionate and have empathy for those poor souls that continued to struggle the way I struggled prior to entering the program.

stem from low self-esteem." That one statement changed my whole way of thinking when it comes to judging anyone else on this planet. I am not God.

By understanding and accepting everyone just the way they are, my self-esteem is at a level where I need not judge anyone. This does not mean that I must be a doormat for others to step on. People will sometimes cross my boundaries at one time or another, but I do not have to roll in the mud with them. I can gracefully back away and not engage myself.

I can still treat them with respect and let them be. I can still wish the best for them with the understanding that they may never find the answer to their problems and I am willing to help if I can. It is as simple as that.

However, if I find myself trying to convince other AA members that they should join my church or political party, I have then gone a bridge too far. The same goes for a treatment center where I once worked. I believe competition is fine in the outside world, but it does not belong in AA rooms. Such is sure to provoke friction.

As for finances, I believe all money placed in the AA basket belongs to AA and nowhere else! Donations should support only the Intergroup; District; Area or GSO. Recovery clubs are considered as "outside enterprises" as well as detox centers and hospitals. Of course, according to Tradition Eight, a group can pay for services rendered, such as printing informational flyers, and like that.

I also believe finances from the group's prudent reserves are approved for group picnics, conferences, and gas money for out-of-town speakers, etc. What if the treasurer of a group donates the group's funds to outside enterprises? Well, is there no retribution? Page xix from the Foreword To The Second Edition, states: "None of these principles have the force of rules or laws."

Of course, there will be rotation and elections. But what if the entire group decides to donate some of its prudent reserve funds to an outside enterprise? This violates the First, Fourth and Sixth Tradition. What to do? Maybe nothing. However, I have seen one instance where the Intergroup Office refrained from listing an AA group that stood in violation of Tradition Three. Tradition Six allows AA to remain autonomously free from outside influence or domination, but we must remain aware of consequences if not followed.

toward Creation, the first panel depicts the post-Flood Noah naked, and in a stuporous state.

Quoting from (KJV) Chapter 9:20-23, "And Noah became a husbandman, and he planted a vinevard: And he drank of the wine, and was drunken: and he was uncovered within his tent. And Ham, the father of Canaan, saw the nakedness of his father. and told his two brethren without. And Shem and Japheth took a garment, and laid it upon both their shoulders, and went backward, and covered the nakedness of their father: and their faces were backward, and they saw not their father's nakedness." The story continues that when Noah awoke and realized what had happened, he cursed Ham and his descendants (Canaanites) saying that they would be forever servants to the houses of Shem and Japheth.

It is interesting that the earliest mention of alcohol in the Bible is accompanied by a description of someone getting wasted. Also of note is the fact that, at least in this case, the enablers were rewarded, and tough love was punished. Was Noah an alcoholic? Probably not. After this incident he lived happily for another 300 years and there is no record of him ever receiving an AUI (Arking Under the Influence).

Alcohol in the form of wine is mentioned frequently in the Bible and there are multiple admonitions regarding its use to excess, however responsible drinking is not frowned upon.

The first public miracle performed by Jesus was turning water into wine for the wedding at Cana in Galilee (John: 2:1-11). Wine was served at the Last Supper and that has served as the basis for its use in the Eucharist or Holy Communion which is a sacrament of several denominations within the



Christian faith.

While Noah may have been the first person to get drunk, he was certainly not the last, and there are many out there who are alcoholics and are drinking themselves to death. We have work to do, carrying the message of Alcoholics Anonymous to those who still suffer.

In my early days in Church and in the Boy Scouts I was taught how to behave. I tried living by the principles I learned in those organizations and I was the oddball.

At that young age I was calling my family out on what I now understand to be alcoholic behaviors. Their response to that was "That little S.O.B. is going to turn out to be a lawyer," and everybody got a drinking and "This time it would be different" but it only got worse, never better.

At the age of twenty-five I remembered those disciplined days in the navy and I re-enlisted. Again, I did my job very well and advanced in rate rapidly. During the next four years I was married, became a father, and was divorced and had to deal with all those issues as I was all over the Pacific during the Vietnam war.

Being a Father was something

It seemed that everything I heard talked about at that meeting was 180 degrees opposite to my past thinking. I immediately began adopting new habits on every issue in my life starting with my responsibilities to my first wife and my son making sure that she understood that she was right to leave me and if that had not have happened, I may not be alive today.

Having gone 180 degrees about

family matters, my current wife and I have just celebrated our 50th anniversary. I got it right the second time around as a by-product of practicing A.A. principals at their deepest levels.

I finished my 20-year career in the Navy. I

> am no longer

laugh out of that.

At the age of seventeen I enlisted in the U.S. Navy and discovered a disciplined environment where I could do my job well and still drink every night and on weekends and not worry about rent payments, food, and shelter.

At the end of my hitch in the navy I went back to my home environment and without the discipline, I was back to my old self again: could not hold a job for long, got into bar room brawls, got two DUIs, broken knuckles, nights in the drunk tank etc.

I tried everything to stop drinking but nothing worked. I tried going on the wagon and after thirty days I would think I could go back to that changed

everything. I had become accountable, and it was something I could not simply dismiss. The divorce threw me into turmoil and after two years of crying in my beer I woke up on Oct. 15, 1969 in desperation and called Alcoholics Anonymous, attended my first A.A. meeting and have never had, nor wanted a drink since that day. It was like walking through the mirror in the Alice in Wonder Land movie. embarrassed about the things I did while under the influence of alcoholic thinking. I became accountable and have made restitution for those actions and deeds many times over and as I live my life on the unselfish side of the ledger, I have nothing to be ashamed of and I live a life of contentment. Alcohol gave me temporary relief from those issues but as the disease progressed it got worse and when I finally ran out of options, my desperation led me to the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous where I found the answers.

Step Seven is a Conclusion

Step Seven Prayer from p. 76 of the Big Book: "My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding. Amen."

"... the Seventh Step prayer concludes with the word 'Amen,' meaning 'so be it,' or indicating a conclusion; however, there is no 'Amen' following the Third Step Prayer, or those in Steps Four, Five and Six! Why?"

There was true humility and deep surrender by asking God to *"take all of me,"* both the *"good"* and the *"bad."* This was an

And the message of our Family Group is this: 'You can have more than an alcoholic sobriety in your own family; you can have emotional sobriety, too. Even if the rest of the family about you hasn't yet found stability, you can still have yours. And your own emotional sobriety often can hasten the happy day of change for them.""



- a. It was m/s/c for Judi to spend approx. \$175 on HVAC system to clean grates and blower motors and assess the system for functionality as recommended by the CDC.
- b. It was m/s/c that a Waiver and Release of Liability will be put into immediate use so that all volunteers, phone and committee, vaccinated and unvaccinated, are able to return to Central Office.





admission that I could not trust myself to differentiate between the two.

I almost drank after five months sobriety before going into the 12-step process with my sponsor. He wisely pointed out the obvious fact that my mind lied to me—It was not to be trusted! I needed a higher power (God) to see the truth about myself.

What an ego-shattering revelation! Yet, it was necessary to give up on myself and trust God to take over my recovery. Someone said: "Self cannot rid self of self with self. "

I had asked God to remove the "bondage of self" in Step Three with only a scant idea of what that was, but Steps Four and Five provided a better view of my defects of character and shortcomings. (By the bye, Bill W. stated that these words were to be used simultaneously or in the same context—please note that Step Seven on page 58 uses the word "shortcomings" rather than "defects of character" as in the prayer above).

It is important to notice that the Seventh Step prayer concludes with the word "Amen," meaning, "So be it" or indicating a conclusion; however, there is no "Amen" following the Third Step Prayer, or those in Steps Four, Five and Six! Why?

I think because Step Seven finally concludes the process.

For example, in Step Three we asked to be relieved of the bondage of self, but we did not know what that was till we did Steps Four and Five. But now—in Step Seven—we know more precisely what we are asking God to remove from us as we go out to do his bidding.

The process has concluded; however, more will be revealed.

The story that exemplified freedom in my life happened to me in my twenty-second year of sobriety when I received a phone call from the current husband of my first wife. He was reading me the riot act about an incident which involved my son and his mother and at the time he erroneously thought that I was involved in it as well.

I tried to be patient and not say anything to provoke him. After he ran out of things to throw into the verbal sparring ring, he finally took one final shot by saying, "Well, I have heard stories about you, and you are no Angel."

My response to this was, "I have done a lot of things in my life that I am not proud of, but I am not ashamed of anything that I have done in the last twenty-two years."

The conversation ended peacefully.

Freedom from guilt and shame was what I became aware of because of that conversation. Then, as I started to look back at all the other negative things on the list of maladjustments, I realized that most of them have been reduced to the point of irrelevance.

Practicing these principles in all my affairs, I do not make as many mistakes, and I never do anything to intentionally hurt anyone.

We cannot change one single event that happened in the past, but we can learn from them, and we can certainly do better in the present with only an occasional stumble.

One of the most important ingredients for me is being totally honest about my motives for things I do on any given day. They are pure and unselfish. Living by principles takes most of the decision-making out of my hands.

That, I think, is what they meant when they wrote the second step. We depend on help outside of ourselves. By getting in the habit of doing it that way the turmoil between my ears slowly diminished and somewhere along the way my head has cleared up and most of the conflicts have subsided.

What a blessing it is to fall asleep each night without all the endless, garbled calculations repeating themselves over and over in my mind until I fell asleep from pure mental exhaustion.

You cannot put a price on Peace of Mind, and a person like me could not have come as far as I have in that Department without the program and the dedicated people around me in the fellowship.

If I had to sum it all up, I would have to say that freedom from that Cauldron, that used to be my thinking, would be first on the list. After years of trial and error, I seem to have settled into a pattern of thinking which is based on principles that I have come to embrace, and which have taken most of the guesswork out of what I do.



The Cauldron is no longer Bubbling between my ears. Now to me, that is freedom.


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

Step Eight: Making a List How I Leveled the Playing Field

Like most of the steps, when I first surrendered and came to Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A,) I did not have a clue about the depth I would have to delve into my past behaviors to free myself from all the guilt and shame that resulted from them. I thought that all I would be talking about was my drinking habits.

When faced with the 12 steps I had my own way of being selective about what part of the suggestions I would embrace and which

Our experience clearly proves that any drinking at all leads to serious trouble for the

alcoholic, or problem drinker. In the words of the American Medical Association:: 'Alcohol, aside from its addictive qualities, also has a psychological effect that modifies thinking and reasoning. One drink can change the thinking of an alcoholic so that he feels he can tolerate another, and then another, and another....

The alcoholic can learn to completely control his disease, but the affliction cannot be cured so that he can return to alcohol without adverse consequences.*'

And we repeat: Somewhat to our surprise, staying sober turns out not to be the grim, wet-blanket experience we had expected! While we were drinking, a life without alcohol seemed like no life at all. But for most members of A.A., living sober is *really* living - a joyous experience. We much prefer it to the troubles we had with drinking.

One more note: anyone can *get* sober. We have all done it lots of times. The trick is to stay and *live* sober. That is what this booklet is about.







"When we get the last molecules of alcohol out of the system, a lot of the gloom disappears along with it. But the habit of thinking in such neurotically depressed ways can stay with some of us, we have found, until we learn to spot it and carefully root it out.

This is no prescription for mindless Pollyanna-ism. We do not pretend that hardships are meaningless, nor deny that everyone has mountains to climb from time to time. Grief really hurts, and so do other kinds of pain.

However, now that we are free of alcohol, we have much more control over our thinking. We have a broader range of thoughts, in minds that are no longer so blurred. The thoughts we choose to spend time on in any given 24 hours can strongly influence the complexion of our feeling for that day - bright and healthy, or murky and disheartened."

suggestions I would simply dismiss as, *ok for you but not necessary for me*. I did not think my problems were about mental, emotional, and spiritual matters. If I could just stop drinking things would be just fine.

It didn't take long for me to realize what they were explaining to me about the wreckage of the past and how to relieve myself of the horrible memories that extended all the way back to my adolescent years. I was

one of the fortunate ones that lost the obsession to drink from the very first day so that was never a problem for me. I had taken step one, I dismissed steps two and three as being ok for the religious folks, but I could do without them.

Steps four, five, eight and nine were the ones that I did not want to face but by the time I was sober for about two years I finally let down my guard and did steps four and five. The relief I got from being fearless and thorough about those two steps gave me the desire and courage to proceed through steps six and seven and those steps will never be finished as they are basically about spiritual growth concerning my thoughts and actions.

Then came *step eight* and the need to identify those people that I had harmed in the past, and I would have to make amends to. *Can they be*

serious? I don't think that a day ever went by during my drinking days that I didn't do something to harm someone. This list would be endless.

With that thought in mind, I delayed doing it until I settled down and came up with an understanding that I could start my list and see where it would lead to. I began with the people I let down the most such as my first wife, my son, my siblings, my mother, and my closest friends that were like family to me. Then I spiraled outward to the people I worked with or played with, such as golfing and fishing, etc. Then, as I started to remember all of those drinking buddies, bar tenders and girlfriends through all those years and I had to be realistic about it. To do this, I could spend the rest of my life chasing people down to apologize and that is when I had to step on the brakes.

Thinking that I would need to chase down all of those ships in the night, was what held me back from doing it. What I finally did was first, to be sure that I no longer did those regrettable deeds of yesterday so that I was not being hypocritical about it. Then I handled the ones that were renting room in the front of my brain box, then as I said, I spiraled outward and handled the ones that were closest to me, and as time went on I found the occasion when I would run into an old friend and if I had anything left undone, I would ask him, "Have you ever done something that you really regretted?" His answer is usually, "Hell yes, who *hasn't?* Then I say. *Can we talk?* This leveled the playing field.

Who can fault a person who, like him, has made mistakes, but then corrected them, made restitution and lives an honest unselfish life?

In our little meeting room, we didn't have a lot of upper end furniture. Someone donated two rows of old theatre seats and they were arranged one behind the other. I seated myself in the center of the front row. This was in 1960.

I went through all of the preliminaries we go through and when it came time to select a topic, I decided to impress everyone and announced the topic to be SELF PITY, for we all know that it is, as stated in the Big Book, the biggest Killer in A.A. We had a lady named Helen B. who always announced herself as "a tough old broad", and she was.

Unfortunately for me, she was seated in the row behind me, one seat to the right. When I finished my sentence, she leaned over and shouted in my right ear, loud enough for everyone in the room to hear. "YOU'RE FULL OF S----, RESENTMENTS ARE THE BIGGEST KILLER IN A.A." and she was right. She gave me a resentment and I wanted to kill her. It was humiliating and humbling at the same time. I grew to love Helen for she did to my ego, what I couldn't do to it myself at the time.

One of the things I took away from that little embarrassing experience was that I better know what I'm talking about before I open my mouth. Another thing that came with that, and other little course corrections, was a drive to understand why I do the things I do. I can hear all of the superficial discussions about the topics we talk about, but I am always inclined to look at the deeper motives that drive me and probably most of us.

Most of the progress that I've experienced in the A.A. program wasn't really as difficult as it seemed, when I was going through it, but it took a lot longer to have the structure in place, such as, honesty, patience, understanding, unselfishness, and so on, to support each level growth.

Intellectually, resentment was one of the things that I could understand, to a degree, but with all of the complicated mental defenses I had bouncing around in my head, my best efforts only produced a slow but steady progress. Most of the resentment issues I had while I was still drinking were usually more of the façade I created with my sick mind. When I got sober, my relationships were real and even then, I, with the help of my ego, had a hard time accepting the day-to-day interfacing with other people.

Much of my attention in the area of resentment seems to revolve around the practice of acceptance. When I am faced with a conflict with, what I consider an unreasonable person or situation, my first instinct is to protect myself. When I examine my motives a little deeper, I find that it's more about defending my ego, and if I am strong enough to, gracefully, back off and defuse the situation, I realize that it works out better. As long as I can remove myself from the situation, I don't have to defend myself or my ego.


Does all this mean that I must take abuse from others in my circle of friends? I always thought there was a conflict of values, like "turn the other cheek" or something like that. Well, I found out through trial and error that we, in the A.A. program, are closely related to more people than the average person out there, and we come to know the personality traits at a much deeper level.

Most people, it is said, can count their friends, in their lifetime, on one hand. We in A.A. probably exceed that standard by a few, but we can't be that kind of friend to everyone. We don't have the amount of energy it takes to sustain that strong a relation.

We can, however, be a friend to everyone by being kind and understanding to them, even when they, themselves, don't reciprocate. Am I going to let my ego stand in the way of my peace of mind? Love is "caring and nurturing another person." I can do that even if they still haven't evolved enough to love me back. I can have compassion for them knowing that I was once in their shoes.

I don't claim I have resolved all of the issues that we are encouraged to tackle, and I don't have all the answers to, even my own questions, but I never stop searching. There are some people that cross my boundaries yet, and all I can do about them is treat them with respect and continue to love and nurture them. They are never the topic of gossip and I refrain from pointing out their (so called) faults. Seldom do I have resentments to the degree that I can recognize them when looking from the inside out, and I am always open to outside suggestions from my true friends on these matters.

"I hate my life," I thought to myself as I awakened. I was so angry that I woke up. I prayed again the night before to a God who I didn't know, or even knew existed. I prayed and pleaded that I wouldn't wake up.

My life sucked and if there was a God, it was a cruel God that laughed and mocked my pain. My life had become a series of obligations and reactions – just enough to get by and "maintain" a somewhat normal appearance.

"The excruciating pain I felt permeated every cell of my body. I wholeheartedly wanted to die. I knew I had a drinking problem, or just a life problem, but Alcoholic? Hmmm...I had serious doubts."

Alcohol and other substances were no longer working to reduce the pain of living my useless life. I would be drunk and stoned and in a pathetic mass of tears. I was

Just take the steps and never give up. It is better than boozing or using.







lonely, frustrated, angry, sad... lost. I knew a couple of people in A.A. and even went to a few meetings with "Him." "He" was another obsession of mine, (besides the mind-altering substances) and He was trying to get sober. Eventually, I also learned that he was my "hostage." I was grateful that I didn't get called on to share at those meetings I attended with Him, since "I wasn't an alcoholic." I was just there to support him. When he broke up with me, I was devastated. Everything I did was for "Him." Being with Him, I drank less, you know, "for Him." I had no life, no identity, without Him. I drank myself into sweet oblivion – You would drink too. Anyone would, right? So, I was truly alone, and my life was lonely, empty and painful. But also, nothing worked anymore to dull my pain. The excruciating pain I felt permeated every cell of my body. I wholeheartedly wanted to die. I knew I had a drinking problem, or just a life problem, but Alcoholic? Hmmm... I had serious doubts.

I had another friend, Joe, who was in A.A. and while I was in the weak spot of desperation, provided by my Higher Power, I called him to see if he could take me to a meeting. I had nothing left to lose and maybe I could find out some answers to my "life problems." He took me to a meeting where I saw someone taking a token and sharing about feelings, really DEEP feelings that up until that moment, I thought were exclusive to me. I knew at that point, someone felt as I did.

EXACTLY how I felt. When they asked for Newcomers, before I knew what happened, I stepped forward, said my name and added, "and I'm an alcoholic." My knees felt weak, and I thought I would collapse, and I was completely dumbfounded as to how I made that statement aloud in such a crowded room of strangers. Fear of public speaking is REAL. Joe and I went out for coffee after the meeting, and I told him that I was stunned by my own admission in the meeting. He told me that he was stunned too... but grateful.

I had to learn how to do my Steps. The "God-thing" was hard for me to grasp, but fortunately it is a "God of my understanding," so it could be anything that I could rely on and be in touch with at any time. The important thing was to have an open-mind. They also told me to "act as if," and I could also "borrow" someone else's Higher Power if I didn't have my own yet. Really?

Immediately I got a sponsor. She helped me find a Higher Power and also realize some of my issues, like codependence. The meeting where I met her was hard for me to attend, and I got another sponsor with whom I worked the 12 Steps. I did a 4th and 5th Step. This is where "the rubber really meets the road." I completed the rest of the steps with that sponsor. My life started getting better - not like I won a lottery or anything immediately earth-shattering. I did realize that I wasn't a victim. I learned that I was my own worst enemy - but, I could also be my own best friend.

That Program is outlined in our Big Book – *Alcoholics Anonymous,* first published in 1939. And while all the particulars are included in that volume, many find difficulty with the language and some of the concepts printed therein. This is why it is universally accepted that one should have a sponsor or spiritual advisor to lead them through those Twelve Steps.

I have had both, a copy of the book and an able and experienced sponsor to work with. However, at least in my case, I am not sure that was enough for me to truly grasp that design for living I was seeking. I needed more in the way of instruction.

The other day I needed to replace the cabin air filter on my Toyota Camry. Sure, I could let the dealer do it for a hundred bucks a hour, or... I looked in the owner's manual for my vehicle and realized that no special tools were required - and there was even a picture presented to help guide me. The instructions were printed clearly in plain English, unlike the tiny font, blurrily-printed instructions in eight languages that accompanied my IKEA entertainment center!

Anyway, even with this guidance, I was having some trouble. A friend suggested that I check to see if there were any YouTube videos on the process. Shazam! There were several, showing the process step-by-step with the protagonists describing what they were doing as they went along. Piece of cake! Done and done.

Then I came to realize that there is an analogy here. The Big Book and my sponsor are like the owner's manual for my car. Great information, but I need to see it in action. That is where my A.A. meetings and the Fellowship come in.

Every day I get to witness my fellow alcoholics in recovery utilizing this design (applying the Steps) in their daily lives. They are my YouTube videos! And they are always current, 21st Century problems with 21st Century solutions! Trouble with a difficult amend? I watched George do it. And Carole gave me step-by-step instructions on reconnecting with my Higher Power. Thank you all!

Could I get all the benefits of the design for living with just the guidance of the Book and a sponsor? I sure would not want to try. Experiencing the pure joy of the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous is a great part of being sober. And I do love those instructional videos! Of course, hugs are nice too.

Step Nine: The Promise Of Intuition

In the early days of 1970, I was going through a course on human behavior and the instructor was trying to describe how the brain functions. He explained that the human brain has approximately ten billion cells and we only use about one billion of them. He then explained that these cells store everything we experience in our lifetime. The more current events are easier to remember than the things that are off in the distant past, but they are all in there somewhere. He then likened it to a file system where, if you ask a question, the more current answers come immediately, but for those more distant memories, the brain starts searching the files and it may take a while eventually the answer will come.

With all the mental chaos that we bring with us when we enter the Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) program, we have lot of, what I refer to as, unlearning to do. We go through the process of trying to rid ourselves of alcoholic thinking and to replace it with sound principles and values. If we are fortunate enough to buy in completely, and do a thorough job of housecleaning, so to speak, we can start using the ideas that we hear of, and others used successfully, and we get a surprisingly good result. We may hear as many as twenty or thirty people share at any given meeting. Can we remember everything we hear? To me, the answer is yes. I could come up with a dozen boilerplate A.A. cliches about how the answers come to me but it does not get any simpler than the mental file cabinet theory. Sometimes it seems to me that I am learning when I am not even listening, and it is like getting it through osmosis. If you have ever heard of the police trying to get a witness to remember a license plate number by hypnotizing that person, you understand what I mean. It is in the sub-conscious and there is a curtain-like screen between the

conscious and subconscious mind. This is what keeps us from going mad due to the busyness of it all.


I never underestimate the capacity of my mind when it comes to problem solving. Attending A.A. meetings on a regular basis and interacting with the people who have had similar experiences and have found similar solutions to their problems gives me a very encouraging outlook for the future. It is surprising how often I awake in the middle of the night, say A-HAH, and go back to sleep again. It seems that intuitively the answers come.

The Co\$t of \$obriety

There exist several histories of the early days in Alcoholics Anonymous. The first, *A.A. Comes of Age*, was published in 1957. Those familiar with this volume may recall that the original 1939 published price of the Big Book was \$3.50.

The actual cost of printing was a fraction of that but there was a profit motive. Financing for the book included the sale of shares of stock (\$25 par value) in Works Publishing, a company founded by Bill W. and Hank P., another early member,

Step Ten in Action How I Leveled the Playing Field





"A very tough-minded prospect was taken to his first A.A. meeting, where two speakers (or maybe lecturers) themed their talks on "God as I understand Him." Their attitude oozed arrogance. In fact, the final speaker got far overboard on his personal theological convictions. Both were repeating my performance of years before. Implicit in everything they said was the same idea: "Folks, listen to us. We have the only true brand of A.A. – and you'd better get it! The new prospect said he'd had it – and he had. His sponsor protested that this wasn't real A.A. But it was too late; nobody could touch him after that. I see 'humility for today" as a safe and secure stance midway between violent emotional extremes. 

"Selfish?"

"I can see why you are disturbed to hear some A.A. speakers say, 'A.A. is a selfish program.' The word 'selfish' ordinarily implies that one is acquisitive, demanding, and thoughtless of the welfare of others. Of course, the A.A. way of life does not at all imply such undesirable traits. What do the speakers mean? Well, any theologian will tell you that the salvation of his own soul is the highest vocation that a man can have. Without salvation – however we may define this - he will have little or nothing. For us of A.A., there is even more urgency. If we cannot or will not achieve sobriety, then we become truly lost, right in the here and now. We are of no value to anyone, including ourselves, until we find salvation from alcohol. Therefore, our own recovery and spiritual growth have to come first - a right and necessary kind of self-concern. Reprinted with permission from A.A.W.S.

clinics. Up to that point most of our members came here looking for answers. The success rate at that time, according to the foreword to the second edition of (the Big Book) *Alcoholics Anonymous* says that 50% of those who came here looking for answers got sober and never drank again; 25% got sober after a few relapses and stayed that way; and the other 25% showed improvement. To me, 75% sounds like a surprisingly good ratio of success.

The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking (Tradition Three). Not everyone who comes to A.A. from the Court System or from a Rehab environment has the same amount of desperation as those original members had. This does not mean that they are not invited, for we treat them with respect, but a large percentage of them do relapse. We welcome them back with open arms so as not to be considered an A.A. failure and eventually many of them do stay sober.

The depth of the desperation is often consistent with the depth of thoroughness a person is willing to go through as he takes the steps and when I was faced with this suggestion - that I do a Fearless and Thorough Moral Inventory in the fourth step, I began to resist. I did what I would call a shallow facade just to get my ticket punched.

Being in the Navy at the time, I was abruptly flown out to the western Pacific during the Vietnam War and assigned to a tanker replenishing the fuel on ships in the Tonkin Gulf Fleet and I had four months to think about what I was going to do on my return home. My conscience told me to discard my original inventory and do it right the second time around.

That I think, is what made the rest of this program easy for me. Being willing to take responsibility for all those disgusting behaviors of yesterday and to make restitution has been the answer to all those alcoholic behaviors in the past.

If we have completed a good 4th and 5th step and again on the 8th and 9th step, how do we approach the 10th step which suggests that we continue to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

Early in my sobriety, my wife came home from an Al-Anon meeting excited about the topic they shared. She said that "We should examine our motives for all the things we do" and that made perfect sense to me. I have been living a life based on Unselfish Principles and I am never done examining my motives. All my out-side behaviors (short-comings) are the result of my thinking (motives) and so long as I am willing to continue this path it has taken all the fight out of me.

"Selfishness--self-Centeredness! That, we think, is the root of our troubles. Driven by a hundred forms of fear, self-delusion, selfseeking, and self-pity we step on the toes of our fellows, and they retaliate." (BB pg. 62, emphasis added) What a Profound statement! Living a life based upon Unselfish Motives has restored my self-esteem and the final and most important result is peace of mind. Never thought that would happen!!! This is my understanding of Step Ten.

After these sorts of "adventures" I was naturally experiencing anger. Maybe worse! Luckily, AA had taught me that repeated thoughts of anger (resentment) could threaten my sobriety – but what to do?

This is where page 84 from the Big Book came in handy. It said to ask God, at once, to remove my anger and then to discuss my defect/shortcoming with someone (LA has clubhouses galore so "*at once*" was no problem). Lastly it suggests: 'We resolutely turned our thoughts to someone we can help." I think this could be a prayer for someone, or even planning a birthday gift. Bill Wilson's Oxford Group mentor, Reverend Sam Shoemaker, summed up AA as: "Out of self, into God, into others."

AA has provided the ability to control my mind, to some degree – at least better than before. I like to *think before I think*! When I feel thoughts of selfishness, dishonest, resentment or fear coming to consciousness, I go to God for help. A simple statement such as, "*Be still and know that I am God,*" seems to calm me down enough to stymie destructive thoughts. What freedom!

I have learned that when negative emotions begin to take over, Step Ten has taught me what to do.

Step Ten is indeed an all-day-long step! Its rewards are beyond belief: *"The problem* (mental Obsession) *has been removed. It does not exist for us."* (p. 85) That is, so long as I remain in a fit spiritual condition—Step Ten allows this to happen.

Of course, the clear-cut directions mentioned on page 29, are *not* laid out on pages 59 and 60 of the Big Book, or on the pull-down "window shades" on the wall. These are only a preview, or a table of contents, if you will, of the Twelve Step process that is explained on the following pages of the Big Book. Bill Wilson tells you what he is going to tell you, then he tells you, then he tells you what he told you.

It was pointed out that there are five clear-cut directions on page 84, and I believe it is important to be aware how I learned how to live them in my life: "Watch for selfishness, dishonesty resentment and fear" was learned in Step Four, "When these crop up, we asked God at once to remove them" was learned in steps Six and Seven; "We discuss them with someone immediately" was learned in Step Five; "Make amends quickly if we have harmed anyone" was learned in Steps Eight and Nine; "Then we resolutely turn our thoughts to someone we can help" was learned in step Twelve.

Following all this is progress – not perfection – for yours truly, and sometimes I don't even come close, yet, God has not allowed me to drink since my first AA meeting. For this I remain eternally grateful.

significant return on their money, and to compensate Hank, and especially Bill, for the work they had put into the book. I have heard it said that the reason the first Big Book was so . . . big (2.6 pounds vs today's 1.9 pounds with 100 more pages than the original) was because the thick paper pages were more easily turned by a newcomer with the shakes. History says otherwise; that Bill and Hank wanted the buyer to think they got their money's worth!

Let us get back to that \$3.50 price tag. You probably dropped more than that on your last trip to Starbucks. But in 1939 that was a substantial sum of money. In 1939 the average wage was 30 cents per hour, the average new car cost \$700 and gas to fuel it was 11 cents per gallon.

Depending upon your generation, your parents, grandparents, or great grandparents could purchase a house for \$4,000 or rent one for \$30 per month. That \$3.50 was a significant investment in a new book which touted a spiritual solution for what was thought to be a moral failing. One could take that money to the grocery store and almost feed a family for a month! For \$3.50 one could buy 75 loaves of bread, 175 pounds of potatoes, or 50 cans of Campbells tomato soup!

So, at \$3.50 was the Big Book a ripoff? Actually, it was not -- that price was in line with similar volumes of its kind. Most other substantial hardbacks cost several dollars in 1939. Using an inflation calculator, \$3.50 in 1939 is equivalent to \$68.75 in today's dollars.

Fortunately, today, one can purchase a hardback copy of the 4th edition of *Alcoholics Anonymous* for \$9.50. It is relatively much less costly to purchase one now than it was when the book was first published.

On a completely different note, much to my sponsor's chagrin, even after decades of sobriety, I am drawn to read the liquor ads which appear in supplements to the Sunday newspaper. For some reason I want to know what my brand (cheap vodka) goes for in today's market.


I got sober during the Reagan administration and in those days, one could purchase a half gallon (64 oz) of the stuff for \$8.00 or so. Today we are metric, at least for jugs of hooch, and that "handle" contains 1.75 liters which, if you were counting (and I am!), is only 59.2 oz. Come on liquor people, did you really think our appetite for the stuff decreased? Sounds like another resentment for another Fourth Step. Anyway, my weekly study of the liquor ads reveals that one can still buy a handle of the stuff for less than \$10.00. By the way, that \$8.00 price tag in 1986 would be \$19.93 today. I was a cheap drunk then and would be a relatively cheaper one today.

So, what have we learned from all this? That, while the cost of ruining one's life has not kept pace with inflation, the cost of saving it is, in many ways, a much better deal!

Excerpts from The A.A. Member --**Medications & Other Drugs (P-11)**

November 2021 **Pamphlet of** the Month

Some alcoholics require medication. "We recognize that alcoholics are not immune to other diseases. Some of us have had to cope with depressions that can be suicidal; schizophrenia that sometimes requires hospitalization; bipolar disorder, and other mental and biological illnesses. Also among us are diabetics, epileptics, members with heart trouble, cancer, allergies, hypertension, and many other serious physical conditions. " - Page 6

AA does not offer medical advice. "I went for 13 years without any medication at all, and I suffered a great deal. Now I take a prescription medication for a mental illness, and I take it as prescribed. My life is much better. I feel it is a blessing to be able to share my story with others. And it is important for newer members to know that A.A. does not offer medical advice."

Affect the alcoholic in a different way. "Experience suggests that while some prescribed medications may be safe for most nonalcoholics when taken according to a doctor's instructions, it is possible that they may affect the alcoholic in a different way. It is often true that these substances create dependence as devastating as dependence on alcohol. It is well known that many sedatives have an action in the body similar to the action of alcohol. When these drugs are used without medical supervision, dependence can readily develop."

No different and not alone

"I can see now that when I first came into A.A., the first thing I did was to start telling myself that I was different. 'Maybe they can't smoke grass, but I can.' 'What do they know about drugs? They never used them.' and slowly, but surely, the pot pulled me back into the very pit of isolation I had seen briefly beyond. Like the alcohol, which at first promised to end my isolation but ultimately turned against me, marijuana led me back into a desolate landscape. But today, I'm no different and I'm not alone." -- Page 18

Additional help

"After I'd been on this medication for four years, I talked to an old-timer. I told him that I felt guilty and inadequate because I took medicine. He opened the Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, to the Doctor's Opinion and told me to read it. Even when the Big Book was written, the founders recognized that alcoholics with mental illness needed additional help." -- Page 15

"...some A.A. members must take prescribed medications. However, our experience indicates that the misuse of prescription medication can threaten the achievement and maintenance of sobriety. 



that seemed to have it figured out and I became a nuisance trying to corner them to get them to explain to me how they do it and they had the same trouble explaining it as I did.

One day I confronted my friend, Jim, and asked him to let me in on the secret. Frustrated, He asked, "Do you want to drink right now?" My answer was "NO." He then asked me, "Did you want to drink a year ago"? And my answer was "YES. I could not go a day without it." Next, he asked me "What made the difference'? My answer was "I was influenced by the A.A. program" His next question was, "Do you have any Problem calling that God?" WOW! What a concept.

I have never wanted a drink since I entered the program and the only answer I could produce was the influence of A.A in my life. For a guy who could not conceive of a day without alcohol, to a guy that has never wanted a drink since, was all I needed to know about God. I wish I could tell you who or what God is, but I cannot. I can, however, tell you what God does for me, but I will get to that later.

The second appendix in the Big Book, (*Alcoholics Anonymous*), "Spiritual Experience," implies that there are many examples of spiritual experiences, and they come in different forms. They can be of the Burning Bush variety or a Psychic Change enough to bring about recovery from Alcoholism. Or, as I like to believe, my spiritual experience came in the form of "A Profound Change of Perception."



When it occurred to me that all my thinking was flawed and that I was finally in an environment where I could, with the help of the group, start to follow simple unselfish guidelines that would restore my self-esteem and put me at peace with myself and others, I started this wonderful journey and I have never had it so good.

These universal truths are common in the meaningful Philosophies of life, and I must seek them out if I want to heal. I pray to God every day, even though I do not know who or what God is. My mind is not evolved enough to understand God and I am not sure that God hears my prayers, but, I HEAR MY PRAYERS and that, I believe, puts me in the best possible attitude I can have about the issue I pray for.

My prayers are always the same. I pray for knowledge of his will for me and strength to carry it out. i.e., God, please show me what to do and please give me the strength to do it, I do not do well on my own. I often knew what to do but was not always strong enough to do what was right. Today I am stronger.

Who or what is God? I am not sure anyone can define God. As a friend of mine (Will) explained, "You do not have to understand Thermodynamics to enjoy the warmth of the sun." I do, however, know what God does. When I ask for guidance, I become a better receiver and I hear the answers that used to pass right over my head when I Thought I had all the answers. Today, I thank God for an open mind.

and that at five years old he was too young to be bad. I explained to him that maybe that boy did not have someone who could teach him how to behave properly.

He continued the conversation and asked, "grandpa, if someone said I was a bad boy..." I stopped him in midsentence and asked, "Who said that you were a bad boy?" He replied, "no one, but if they did..." I stopped him again and said, "if anyone says that you're a bad boy, you can just say, "I'm not a bad boy. **I'm just a kid learning how to do life**."

At a meeting shortly thereafter, the topic was on resentment, and, for lack of a better analogy, I told the story of my grandson and how I look at everyone in the same way. Most people act out, to compensate for deeper rooted emotional problems.

None of us are perfect. We all have shortcomings and for me to condemn someone else, who may be plagued by these things and has not resolved

them yet, would be like piling on, and I always feel worse when I resort



back to those old behaviors. I should never let my emotions, or my ego draw me into conflict with other troubled people. I must always try to take the high road in these situations. But what about when other people cross my boundaries in a negative way, do I have to be a doormat? No, I do not have to participate in it with them, if there is a way to remove myself from the situation, but I should not be judgmental either. I must refrain from pointing out that other person's faults.

To me, they are like my grandson's little classmate. They are all like, KIDS LEARNING HOW TO DO LIFE, and for me to engage in criticism in that situation would be like two old men in a care facility hitting each other with their canes because one was not walking fast enough for the other.

It sounds funny, but we do it every day. I am no better or worse than the next man. I may be further along the path than him, but no better. I pray for understanding and compassion in these situations. I must never judge a man on his surface behavior, I must have the strength to look deeper. We are *all just like those KIDS LEARNING HOW TO DO LIFE*.

A few months after that discussion with my grandson we were running a little late taking him to his Taekwondo class and he was in his child seat behind us in the car and I was bickering with my wife about getting there on time when he interrupted us saying "Guys, I can hear you." I responded by saying, "you should have been ready yourself" and he responded, "Grandpa, I am not a bad boy, I am just a kid learning how to do life." My wife and I broke out in laughter. God, I love that kid.

chapter on the Eleventh Step in *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions.* This suggests using the prayer of Saint Francis as a focus. "As beginners in meditation, we might now reread this prayer several times very slowly, savoring every word and trying to take in the deep meaning of each phrase and idea…let us relax and breathe deeply of the spiritual atmosphere with which the grace of this prayer surrounds us." (12x12 pp. 99-100). This sounds doable, right?

My sponsor said to try this for half an hour. Let's begin, "Lord, make me a channel of thy peace..." Wait, how will I know when 30 minutes are up? I have heard of people going into a trance or falling asleep while meditating. I best set an alarm lest I go overtime and end up being late for my 8 o'clock meeting. The last time I was late I had to park on the street and that guy in the red pickup boxed me in! I couldn't leave until he had finished talking to some newcomer – took his own sweet time about it too.

All right, let me set my phone for 30 minutes...oh wait, there is a text from Phyllis. I really should get to this, might be something important about tonight's meeting...OK, not that important, I'll answer it later.

"Lord, make me a channel..." You know, I really need more focus here. Perhaps just sitting here on the sofa won't do it. I have seen others get into that Yoga position (Locust maybe?) while they meditate. Shouldn't be a problem, I'm pretty fit, always do my stretches after going to the gym. Perhaps this will help me focus. OK, I'm sitting on the floor, and I'll just bend one leg this way, and put the other heel...Oh, Oh, Ow! OK that's not happening today. Note to self – warm up before meditating.

Back to Saint Francis, "Lord, make me a channel..." Oh my God, I almost forgot to set the DVR to record the Padres game! Going to miss part of it because of the H&I commitment. I certainly hope those folks on the psych ward appreciate the sacrifices we make to carry the message to them!





Are you available to serve Alcoholics Anonymous? Availability is about: "do I have the suggested sobriety? If there are other suggested qualifications, do I have those qualifications and to the best of my knowledge, do I have no scheduling conflicts to serve in the commitment?" If my answers to all of those questions are yes, I should make myself available and let my Higher Power decide if that is the position I should be in." Also, please talk to the members in your group about serving on the Council. Members at large may be elected to positions. It is not required that you are a

Coordinator to serve on a committee.

moment. What I

didn't understand was that drinking was but a symptom of a much deeper-rooted *emotional problem* and after many years of sobriety, I still had trouble articulating how one caused the other.

In the first paragraph of *Step Twelve* in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions (12&12) it talks about finding emotional sobriety. What emotions are we talking about, that's what I wanted to know? As a child, I had very little supervision and I grew up in a dysfunctional environment. I did a lot of things that I was ashamed of, but I never knew how these things would come back to haunt me later in life. As I started drinking, it immediately relieved me of the guilt and shame, and it even gave me license to continue acting badly as long as I could rationalize and lie about my behavior. The only thing that I hadn't considered was that I couldn't hide from my Conscience, and it plagued me until I couldn't sleep at night without drinking myself into oblivion.

I had been a taker all my life. I never got enough of what I thought I needed. I was insecure. I had no self-esteem. No one had any respect for me except for the *(want to be)* losers like myself. *Guilt and shame,* brought on by *a hundred forms of fear ruled my mind*. 



Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind, Obedient, Cheerful, Thrifty, Brave, Clean, and Reverent. In sports I learned of Teamwork and of Disappointment. In kindergarten, I learned to play fair in the sand box, and I also heard of the Golden Rule.

These things have been around long before me and even before A.A; so, where did I go wrong?

I, like most of us that come into the program, had a myriad of personal

problems, and at first, I believed that those life issues including Marital, Legal, Economic, Physical, etc.; were the cause of my drinking the way I did.

At that time, I was not sophisticated enough to understand the ins and

outs of these things. I am not sure that anyone can just drop what they have been conditioned to do just because they quit drinking.

There must be more to it than that. If, at first, we are fortunate enough to envision the wonderful life we can experience as the result of fully embracing this program, we will first want to clear up the wreckage of the past.

This we can do by thoroughly going through the steps in the

spirit that they were intended, being careful not to hold back anything. As we approach the twelfth step, we are introduced to the Saint Francis prayer in the 12&12.

Francis was not a saint when he wrote this prayer, but he expresses that these virtues were the answer to all the misguided thinking of the past. Note that not one of his requests is for help with things that are of a selfish or material nature.

I am not affiliated with any religious organization, but I am not threatened by religious doctrines, and I agree with the statement on pg. 87 of the Big

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> Book: "Be quick to see where religious people are right. Make use of what they offer."

I am sometimes honored when a newer member of the program asks for some guidance and I will usually suggest that he/she write out this prayer in long-hand, paste it on his/her mirror and read it every day for a minimum of 30 days, and I guarantee that it will influence your thinking for the rest of your life. It did for me.

I do not know of a more practical thing to set the tone for a person's interactions with others. Thinking back on it, I always knew the right thing to do, but was not always strong enough to do it. I dismissed these things, not realizing the pain that would result as I lost my direction in life. The Saint Francis prayer is one of the ways in which the program suggests we revisit our early value system. It gives us some spiritual direction that deals with the change in our inner self, which, if we heal in that area, the material world will take care of itself.

When faced with a sticky situation, I have a choice whether to escalate it or to back off and withdraw with love and understanding. After years of trying my best to live in the spirit of this prayer, it occurred to me that, as the result, I qualify in all those things I learned as a child, in church, in the Boy Scouts, in Kindergarten, The Golden Rule, and in childhood sports. To me, it is an ALL-ENCOMPASSING SPIRITUAL roadmap.

When they ask me what freedom I cherish the most as the result of practicing the program, most of my fellow members would expect me to say freedom from Alcohol but, they would be mistaken. I would reply that the *freedom from*

all those unresolved mental issues that plagued me to the point that only a drink would quiet my mind.

The hope that I experienced the minute I embraced this program, at the level of my innermost self, removed the obsession to drink alcohol and it has never returned. I no longer have any fear of alcohol. Having cleaned up the wreckage of the past by thoroughly taking the steps and ridding myself of selfish motives, my conscience is clear. My self-esteem is High, and the feeling of wellbeing is my constant companion.

I'm so glad that I didn't fall into that category that become complacent and think that I could rest on my laurels (as they say) at any point, as I understand the meaning of Step Twelve suggests, *Practicing These Principles in all our Affairs*. I try always to be an asset and never a liability. I am neither a victim nor perpetrator. I am always willing to make things right as best I can. I can be trusted and relied upon. I feel that I am on the positive side of the ledger.

Peace of mind and a quiet heart have been my goal ever since I entered A.A. and I am happy to say that I haven't been disappointed. One of my favorite prayers is: *Thank You God; it's* everything you promised it would be.

were, save from my own vague interpretations from the club house pull-down shades. My honeymoon enthusiasm did not qualify me as having had a "spiritual experience (or awakening) as the result of these steps." (Spiritual Experience means suddenly. Spiritual Awakening means slowly – p. 567)

Eventually, after absorbing the clear-cut directions from the Big Book, I busily began sharing my newfound sobriety with other members, but when some of them relapsed I was disappointed. However, I took solace in that Step Twelve tells us only that: "we

tried." However, I believe that it is vitally important that I continue to keep on trying regardless of results:

"Nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking than intensive work with other alcoholics." (P. 89). <u>Vital</u> means lifesaving – that means me!

I have found it best **not** to dwell on the steps when making my first visit to a newcomer, but to casually drift the conversation into some of my drinking experience, good and bad; happy and sad; but explain why I needed to stay sober. Then explain how the AA fellowship helped me to obtain my period of sobriety. Of course, never mention that he or she is an alcoholic — this is best for them to ascertain!

I believe it is best to bring out the aspects of AA that will dispel any preconceived fear, such as: "The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking;" explaining our principle of anonymity; that we have no dues or fees; that we have no rules or laws; that AA is not affiliated with any religion or outside organization. Explain that we are not a treatment center, although we sometimes cooperate with treatment facilities. I believe it is important to tell how we have grown to over two-million members around the world in the last eighty-plus years. The point is to replace newcomer doubt with hope! Then I like to share about my personal sobriety. The point

> that the new person will have hopeful expectations before his or her first meeting.


Upon leaving This "first meeting" I

believe it is paramount that the new person leaves with appropriate literature from the meeting rack, but not too much just three or four. The titles make it obvious what ones are appropriate. If the new person leaves with a Big Book, I never tell them to read the first 164 pages maybe just THE DOCTORS OPINION, along with some of the personal stories. A farmer once told me: "You don't feed a newborn calf a bale of hay, but just a little milk."

Of course, point out from the meeting directory where the next meeting might be best and exchange phone numbers or email addresses. If time allows, I like to have a meeting- after-the-meeting to provide a welcome and happy atmosphere. First impressions are very important for a lost and lonesome new AA member. Just my thoughts.
