Second Chances

I remember feeling helpless, defeated, and alone when I arrived at Alcoholic Anonymous. My last few years of drinking were tainted with unattractive behavior, embarrassing situations, and desperate measures to try and hold my life together. Despite periodic attempts to reach out for help from friends, therapists,

religious affiliations, AA, and inpatient recovery programs. I could not stop drinking. I eventually tried AA again, but one

What Are the 12 Promises of Alcoholics Anonymous?

You may be wondering, 'what are the AA Promises?', 'how are the AA Promises explained?' or 'what page are the Promises on in the Big Book?' The AA Promises are found on pages 83-84, Chapter 6: Into Action in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous: The story of how more than one hundred men have recovered from alcoholism. The 12 Promises of AA are presented as part of Step 9, which involves making amends. The 9th Step Promises are presented as out-loud readings at the end of AA meetings, usually before the closing prayer.

1. We are going to know a new freedom and a new happiness. People who finish the Steps will experience relief from the suffering of addiction and feel free to pursue a new life without alcohol.








A.A. Economics

The word "God" was FRIGHTENING to me when I FIRST saw it associated with A.A.'s TWELVE Steps. Having tried all the MEANS I could to STOP drinking, I found that it was not POSSIBLE for me to SUSTAIN that desire over a period of time. Yet, how could I BELIEVE in a "God" that had allowed me to SINK to the deep DESPAIR that engulfed me — whether DRINKING or dry? The ANSWER was in finally admitting that it might be possible for me to know the MERCY of a Power greater than MYSELF who could GRANT me SOBRIETY contingent on my willingness

to "come to believe." By finally <u>ADMITTING</u> that I was one among many, and by following the example of my <u>SPONSOR</u> and other A.A. members in practicing <u>FAITH</u> I did not have, my <u>LIFE</u> has been given meaning, direction, and PURPOSE.



Book of the Month: Daily Reflections

"September 28 - LOVE WITHOUT STRINGS Practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. — ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS, p. 89

Sponsorship held two surprises for me. First, that my sponsees cared about me. What I had thought was gratitude was more like love. They wanted me to be happy, to grow and remain sober. Knowing how they felt kept me from drinking more than once. Second, I discovered that I was able to love someone else responsibly, with respectful and genuine concern for that person's growth. Before that time, I had thought that my ability to care sincerely about another's well-being had atrophied from lack of use. To learn that I can love, without greed or anxiety, has been one of the deepest gifts the program has given me. Gratitude for that gift has kept me sober many times."

Continued from Page 1 Very early on in our sobriety the above quotation is one that just keeps us away from the that first drink which alcoholics have succumbed to countless times. "I'll start tomorrow", "I don't care, anymore", and "I'll have just one" were just some of the reasons to justify the return to this disease yet again. Chapter 3 provides us with a list of all the ways we tried to stop. We were powerless and it worsened. Many of us have had to endure a case of the shakes, DT's, night sweats, no sleep, and worse. Finally, you wake up one morning, you don't feel like having a drink, and physically you feel somewhat normal. I've gone through hell. The worst is over. Wrong! This is only the beginning of the long journey. Now the fourth step. A fearless and moral inventory of ourselves wasn't going to be an easy task at all. More going through hell recalling all the things we should have done differently. Not only did an inventory have to be done but we had to tell someone and when possible, make amends to people we had harmed. Somehow, the basic concept made just enough sense to follow through. The process began to unfold. There was a small light at the end of the tunnel. It also included things like the IRS. possibly jail or probation, paying back stores we might have stolen from, and on and on. When you get to the end you say now the worst is over. Again, wrong answer!

Life goes on regardless of our sobriety and we are faced with an array of situations ranging from sickness, loss of loved ones, divorce, even being homeless. Instead of wallowing in our selfpity we are now armed with tools to deal with these kinds of situations. Don't sit down in your own hell but do your footwork, turn it over to your higher power, and accept what the outcome is. We are no longer in control! As the quote says just keep on going. There are no guarantees save one. You won't get drunk if you don't take the first drink. If you don't get drunk, you can walk through your own hell and there is light at the end of the tunnel. If you do drink, there is also a guarantee. You'll wallow in your own hell,

sobriety date led to another. I couldn't get any time together but told my friends, family, coworkers, and fellow alcoholics otherwise. I was the keeper of secrets and lived a double life, not knowing where I fit in or where I belonged. I had one foot precariously in the drinking world and the other unsteadily in Alcoholics Anonymous. In my mind there was absolutely no way of turning my life around

or of wiping the slate clean and getting a fresh start

As one of my AA friends likes to say "No one went to one meeting too many!" and I started to hear the message. I read in our Big Book and heard in meetings that recovery begins when one alcoholic talks with another alcoholic — sharing experience, strength, and hope. My fellow alcoholics lived up to their reputation of speaking "the language of the heart in all its power and simplicity" as described in the Forward to the Fourth

Edition of Alcoholics Anonymous. That was definitely music to my ears, and I most certainly needed to have my spirits lifted. Like so many before me I had finally admitted complete defeat and was ready To surrender to a spiritual program of recovery that millions of alcoholics had followed to a new beginning. Then in Bill's Story I was comforted to find "It was only a matter of being willing to believe in a Power greater than myself. Nothing more was required of me to make my beginning. There is an old Chinese Proverb that says: "A journey of a thousand miles must begin with a single step." If you believe as I do that any first step can prove to be the most difficult then Step One, "We admitted we were powerless over alcohol, that our lives had become unmanageable", may seem to be an insurmountable task.

It was for me at first. Fortunately, our founders were prepared for stubborn cases like me when they wrote in Step One in the Twelve Steps and Twelve

We know
that little good can
come to any alcoholic who


joins AA unless he has first accepted his devastating weakness. Until he so humbles himself his sobriety if any - will be precarious. Of real happiness he will find none at all." Those words caught my attention. I had been humbled into submission. I longed to be free from alcohol. I was ready to try something different. And so it was that I was able to surrender and admit that I was powerless over alcohol and that my life was unmanageable by me alone. And just as I had read in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions it became surprisingly clear to me that it is "only through utter defeat are we able to take our first steps toward liberation and strength." I had my second chance, a new beginning!

We will not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it. Those who work the program will gain a sense of acceptance that allows



- 3. We will comprehend the word serenity. Addiction can lead to a constant state of inner turmoil. The AA program helps people find a calmness that is rare during the active use of alcohol and which many alcoholics have never known in their lives.
- 4. We will know peace. The 4th Promise builds on the 3rd Promise, acknowledging that a life of peace and undisturbed tranquility will be experienced.
- 5. No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will see how our experience can benefit others. Many individuals with a substance use disorder don't believe that other people understand what they've been through but, in Alcoholics Anonymous, they often meet people who can identify with and learn from their experiences.
- 6. That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will disappear. Addiction can make people feel worthless and guilty about their actions. The Steps can help individuals feel that their lives have a meaning and a purpose, particularly through helping others.
- 7. We will lose interest in selfish things and gain interest in our fellows. Addiction can lead to

centered behaviors. Helping other people find recovery can bring alcoholics outside of themselves and help them develop a genuine interest in other people.

- 8. **Self-seeking will slip away**. The tunnel vision of focusing only on oneself and drinking usually begins to fade as people work the Steps.
- 9. Our whole attitude and outlook upon life will change. AA can shift one's perspective from hopelessness to hope. People can begin to imagine a life where they are happy.
- 10. Fear of people and of economic insecurity will leave us. Alcoholics who recover through AA don't feel like they must continue to hide or worry about how to support their addiction and maintain financial security.
- 11. We will intuitively know how to handle situations which used to baffle us. As the AA member gets deeper into the recovery process, they begin to see situations more clearly and can tap into their inner resources.
- 12. We will suddenly realize that God is doing for us what we could not do for ourselves.

 The concept of a higher power is central to AA. This higher power, be it God or something else, becomes a guiding force in the person's life.
